Attack on Afghan ministry disrupts calm

KABUL, Afghanistan — Multiple explosions and repeated gunfire echoed through downtown Kabul on Saturday during an attack on a government ministry.

At least four militants unleashed a bomb blast around noon before storming the compound of Afghanistan's Telecommunications Ministry and detonating several other bombs, according to Afghan officials.

Militants set off the blast by the wall of the ministry and then tried to get inside the building, said Nasrat Rahimi, spokesman for the Ministry of the Interior. Nasart Rahimi, a spokesman for the Interior Ministry, told The Associated Press four civilians and three soldiers were killed during the attack. Eight civilians were wounded, he said.

All four attackers are now dead, along with three members of the Afghan security forces, a statement added.

The attackers were able to enter the ministry building and fought with government forces from there, a witness told Tolo News.

Police entered the building to conduct clearance operations and evacuated the ministry's 2,000 workers, Kabul Police Chief Sayed Mohammad Roshandil told Tolo News.

About five hours after the

attack began, the Ministry of Interior declared the incident over.

The blast occurred in the heart of the capital city of Kabul, a mile and a half from the U.S. Embassy and NATO Resolute Support headquarters, and next to the presidential palace, one of the city's most popular hotels and many government buildings.

The Taliban in a statement denied involvement in the attack.

Photos posted online appeared to show the attackers dead and wearing a type of Afghan police uniform.

Anti-government militants used false uniforms in another attack on a government ministry last spring. Gunmen then used American uniforms to attack the Afghan Interior Ministry. Gen. John Nicholson, the top U.S. commander in the country at the time, said phony uniforms had been used in the past by militants.

The fighting broke a relative calm that had settled over the city in recent months, during which the U.S. has negotiated with Taliban leaders in a bid to end the nation's longest war.

Talks between the Taliban and 250 Afghan politicians fell apart in recent days due to disagreements about how many delegates were supposed to come to the planned meeting in Qatar.

Blue Angels gear up for a new era in new planes

PENSACOLA, Fla. — As the 2019 Blue Angels delight fans at air shows nationwide this year, two former Blue Angels have been busy laying the groundwork for one of the biggest changes in the team's nearly 75-year history.

Capt. Ryan Bernacchi, commander of the 2016-2017 Blue Angels, and Cmdr. Frank Weisser, who flew with the team from 2008-2010 and again in 2016 and 2017, recently oversaw a team of experts helping the Blue Angels change airplanes for the first time in more than 30 years. The Blue Angels are tentatively scheduled to start flying the F/A-18 Super Hornet in 2021, the team's 75th anniversary season. The move to the Super Hornet will mark the first time the elite Navy and Marine fighter jet demonstra-

tion team has changed aircraft since it moved from the A-4F Skyhawk II to the F/A-18 Hornet back in 1986.

Both Bernacchi and Weisser said the new aircraft will mean exciting changes in the demonstration and a new era for the Blue Angels.

"The jet is more powerful, especially at lower altitudes, so we believe that our maneuvering will be more visible to the crowd and more impressive overall," Weisser said in response to a series of emailed questions from the News Journal. "That increased performance will also allow us to alter some maneuvers to better showcase the aircraft's very unique capabilities." Bernacchi and Weisser did a lot of their work in flight simulators at Naval Air Station Patuxent River in Maryland. They first tried to recreate the

existing F/A-18 Blue Angels' demonstration in the Super Hornet using the simulator.

"Along the way, we worked closely with the engineering experts at Pax, folks that have unmatched knowledge about the F-18 flight dynamics, engines, flight control systems, fuel systems and airframe fatigue factors."

The team configured an artificial feel system in the simulator to mimic the 40-pound spring, which Blue Angels attach to their jet's flight stick to provide the precision control needed to fly the tight formations that are a hallmark of their flying. They also introduced engine flameouts, control failures and other unexpected emergencies in the simulator to see how the Super Hornet performed under the demands of the demonstration.

"We wanted to understand what the effects would be and ensure there is a safe procedure to handle any situation that could possibly arise, no matter how unlikely," Bernacchi said.

Although some things will change with the newer aircraft, other things will stay the same.

The Blue Angels will continue to fly without the traditional G-suits worn by other fighter jet pilots when they change to the Super Hornet.

Overall, Weisser said, the new aircraft and advanced software will provide the pilots with more situational awareness and faster access to critical flight information. "We very much believe this will not only make the show safer to fly but more enjoyable to the crowd," he said.

How the CNO impacted collision probe

WASHINGTON — Lt. Cmdr. Jennifer Pollio could not believe what she was hearing from the Navy's top officer.

It was Jan. 25, 2018, and Adm. John Richardson, chief of naval operations, was addressing an auditorium filled with Navy attorneys. One officer asked a question that touched on a sensitive topic: two collisions of warships in the Pacific in the summer of 2017 that left 17 sailors dead in the Navy's worst maritime accidents in decades.

The Navy had recently announced that it would criminally prosecute the captains of the vessels and several crewmembers for negligence leading to the fatal accidents. The questioner wanted to know whether officers now had to worry about being charged with a crime for making what could be regarded as a mistake.

Richardson answered by saying that he could not discuss pending cases. As a bedrock principle of military law, commanders cannot signal a preferred outcome. But then, almost as an afterthought, he attempted to reassure the man that the collisions were not accidents.

"I have seen the entire investigation. Trust me, if you had seen what I have seen, it was negligent," Richardson told the audience, according to court records.

Pollio, a Navy attorney, was alarmed. It appeared to her that Richardson had effectively pronounced guilt before trial. And he had done so in public, in front of an audience whose members could conceivably participate in the military's judicial proceedings.

"I was shocked that he would say that," Pollio would later recall in court testimony.

Commanders are central to military

justice. In most cases, they select jurors, approve plea deals and have a say in the outcomes. The prosecutors, defense lawyers and judges are often all servicemembers. They are charged with being independent, but some, inevitably, are conscious of their careers and the desires of higher-ups.

It is a system rife with the potential for bias. That's why commanders are forbidden from even giving the appearance of trying to sway results. Unlawful command influence has been called the "mortal enemy of military justice" because it undermines faith in the system's fairness — not just among members of the military but the general public, too.

Yet the January meeting was neither the first time nor the last that Richardson would be accused of attempting to influence the results of the inquiry into the collisions of the USS Fitzgerald and USS John S. McCain.

That fall, Richardson had told reporters at a press conference that the ships' officers were "at fault" because of their negligence. On another occasion, he told reporters that "there was nothing that was outside the commanding officer and the crews' span of control" before the collisions. In testimony before Congress, he again held the captains of the ships culpable, saying they "had complete ownership" of the causes of the collisions.

Richardson made investigating the accidents involving the Fitzgerald and the McCain a primary focus of his command of the Navy. He ordered multiple in-depth examinations of the incidents. He promulgated reforms designed to put more sailors on ships based overseas and increase training in basic navigation skills.

But his pursuit of accountability for indi-

vidual sailors has been deeply troubled, and the prosecutions of the men and women on the two destroyers are today in shambles. Richardson, who holds the most senior uniformed position in the Navy, was found by a judge to have violated the protections against undue command influence, a stunning result in one of the most high-profile cases of military justice in years.

A ProPublica examination of the cases based on confidential Navy documents, emails among top officials, court records and interviews shows that the criminal prosecutions of the accidents involving the Fitzgerald and the McCain were marred by questionable decisions and egregious mistakes.

On April 10, after ProPublica informed the Navy of its findings, the Navy told families of the fallen sailors that Richardson would announce that he was dismissing the cases against the captain of the Fitzgerald and a junior officer. Instead, both will receive letters of censure from Richard Spencer, the secretary of the Navy, a public finding of wrongdoing.

"The cases are being dismissed for legal reasons that impeded the continued prosecution of either officer," read the message, which was obtained by ProPublica. "Your loved ones did not die in vain; their legacy lives in the form of a stronger and more capable Navy."

A Navy spokesman confirmed the actions.

"This decision is in the best interest of the Navy, the families of the Fitzgerald sailors and the procedural rights of the accused officers," read a statement.

The unraveling of the cases against the sailors began soon after the collisions.

Navy shows commitment to robotic submarines

The U.S. naval fleet of the future may one day include submarines without a sailor from bow to stern that prowl the depths of the ocean, navigating mine-infested waters to gather intelligence or even clandestinely drop explosives. The military views autonomous vehicles as a way to accomplish missions deemed too risky, mundane or expensive for human crews. While aer-

ial drones have largely been tasked with these types of duties for more than a decade, the Navy is now increasingly funding robotic ships and undersea drones to complement the work done by its crewed vessels.

Last month, Boeing Co. beat out rival Lockheed Martin Corp. for a \$46.7 million Navy contract modification to build an Orca undersea drone. Boeing had previously won a contract to build four of the Orca drones, bringing the total contract value for the five to \$274.4 million. A large chunk of work will be done at the aerospace giant's Huntington Beach facility, and the drones are expected to be completed by 2022.

Neither Boeing nor the Navy have disclosed the size of the robot submarines, but Boeing has previously developed and tested a 51-foot-long underwater drone prototype called the Echo Voyager. cal year 2020 funding request for further development of uncrewed surface vessels and undersea drones, indicates a new level of commitment to autonomous sea operations.

gray submarine-shaped drone has completed more than 2,500 hours of ocean testing, including two sea trials.

Eventually, the Navy could pair the underwater drones with their uncrewed surface counterparts.

Camera found in bathroom aboard ship

The Navy is investigating after a female Marine found a camera hidden in a women's bathroom aboard the amphibious dock transport USS Arlington during a security operation in the Mediterranean Sea, Navy officials said Saturday.

The Navy is looking into who put the camera in the bathroom and what might have been recorded before the Marine discovered the device in March.

"The Navy/Marine Corps team takes all reports of sexual harassment seriously and are committed to thoroughly investigating these allegations and providing resources and care to victims of sexual harassment," said Cmdr. Kyle Raines, a 6th Fleet spokesman, in a statement on Saturday.

The Navy can't release details on an active investigation or identify victims, Raines said.

Investigators are looking into whether the camera took still photos or videos or streamed an unrecorded live feed, he said.

The vessel is on a seven-month deployment in Europe and the Middle East.

The ship, which was docked Friday in Greece, deployed from the East Coast in December with the USS Kearsage, USS Fort McHenry and the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit as part of an amphibious ready group.

US servicemember dies in Iraq incident

An American servicemember died Saturday in a noncombat incident in northern Iraq, the military said.

The identity of the servicemember, who died in Nineveh province, would not be released until after next of kin were notified, Operation Inherent Resolve said in a brief statement that gave no further information about the circumstances of the death.

U.S. troops are continuing to serve in Iraq as part of a coalition to train, advise and assist local forces in the fight against an Islamic State insurgency, after helping bring an end to the terrorist group's physical "caliphate" in Iraq and Svria.

Last month, President Donald Trump announced that U.S.-backed forces in Syria had retaken the last of the ISIS-held territory.

Still, the terrorist group has continued to carry out violent attacks in both Iraq and Syria and remains a threat.

Inherent Resolve said in a statement earlier this month that the group maintains an underground network of cells and that the U.S.-led coalition is continuing to provide Iraqi security forces the training needed to defeat those cells.

ISIS militants ambush Syrian government troops

BEIRUT — Islamic State militants ambushed Syrian government forces in the country's desert, setting off two days of clashes that killed over two dozen soldiers, a war monitoring organization said Saturday.

A pro-government militia confirmed the ambush, saying it had sent its fighters to liberate the two besieged battalions.

The Islamic State lost its last territories in Syria in March after months of battles with U.S-backed Kurdish-led fighters in the eastern province of

Deir el-Zour.

But the militants remain active in the desert to the west of Deir el-Zour, where they have taken refuge and increasingly targeted government troops and allied militia.

The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said ISIS militants ambushed government forces in the desert of central Homs province Thursday night, setting off clashes that lasted for two days. The Observatory said at least 27 soldiers were killed, including four officers.

Liwa al-Ouds, a pro-govern-

ment militia, said its fighters deployed to the desert area to liberate 500 soldiers besieged east of al-Sukhna town.

In a Facebook post, the militia said it successfully broke the siege and liberated the surviving soldiers, before pulling the bodies of those killed and damaged vehicles to safety.

Liwa al-Quds, one of the elite militias operating side by side with government troops, didn't give a casualty figure.

Activists have reported a rise in clashes between government forces and allied troops and ISIS militants following the end of the extremist's presence in the nearby Deir el-Zour province.

The militant group, which once controlled large swathes of territory in Syria and Iraq, has kept a network of sleeper cells active in both countries.

It has also kept up its media operations. The ISIS-affiliated Aamaq news agency reported the attack east of al-Sukhna, adding that in 24 hours of clashes its militants killed nearly two dozen Syrian soldiers and officers.

Family says boy thrown from mall balcony is recovering

MINNEAPOLIS — The family of a 5vear-old boy thrown off a third-floor balcony at the Mall of America last week says he's "showing real signs of recovery" but remains in intensive care.

The boy's family posted the update Fri-

day on a GoFundMe page that has raised nearly \$900,000 for Landen's medical expenses. Beyond the fundraising page, Landen's family has asked for privacy. Prosecutors have charged Emmanuel Aranda. 24. with attempted premeditated first-degree murder for the April 12 attack.

Aranda told police he was angry at being rejected by women at the Minnesota mall and was "looking for someone to kill." Landen plunged almost 40 feet and suffered head trauma and multiple broken bones.

His family says he still has "a long road ahead" to recovery.

Storms kill girl in Fla., spur twister threat

ATLANTA — A strong storm system barreling through the South killed an 8-year-old girl in Florida and threatened to bring tornadoes to large parts of the Carolinas and southern Virginia.

A tree fell onto a house Friday in Woodville, Fla., south of Tallahassee, killing the girl and injuring a 12-year-old boy, according to the Leon County Sheriff's Office. The office said in a statement that the girl died at a hospital while the boy suffered non-life-threatening injuries. Their names weren't immediately released.

The same storm system was blamed for the deaths a day earlier of three people in Mississippi and a woman in Alabama.

The threat on Friday shifted farther east, where tornado

warnings covered parts of northeast Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia, where four suspected tornado touchdowns were reported Friday night. Twisters touched down in Reston, Fredericks Hall, Barham and Forksville. Homes and small structures were damaged, but no injuries were immediately reported.

The national Storm Prediction Center said 9.7 million people in the Carolinas and Virginia were at a moderate risk of severe weather. The region includes the Charlotte, N.C. metro area.

Torrential downpours, large hail and a few tornadoes were among the hazards, the National Weather Service in Raleigh, N.C., warned.

Radar readings appeared to show a tornado formed in western Virginia's Franklin County, south of Roanoke, though damage on the ground still must be assessed, said National Weather Service Meteorologist Phil Hysell. In South Carolina, authorities urged motorists to avoid part of Interstate 26 the main artery from Upstate through Columbia and all the way to Charleston — because downed trees had left the roadway scattered with debris.

In Georgia, the storm system knocked down trees, caused flooding and cut off power to tens of thousands of people.

In Forsyth County northeast of Atlanta, three firefighters suffered minor injuries when their firetruck overturned during heavy rain and wind, Fire Department Division Chief Jason Shivers told the newspaper.

Meanwhile, hundreds of people cleaned up part of a central Mississippi town hit hard by a tornado on Thursday. Volunteers and family members were swarming the north side of Morton, where the National Weather Service says a twister with winds as high as 132 mph hit a neighborhood. More than 20 homes were heavily damaged or destroyed. The town of 3,500 is about 30 miles east of Jackson.

"When it stopped, there was nothing left," Morton resident Sharon Currie told WAPT-TV. "I was going, 'Oh my God. My house is gone.""

Forecasters confirmed that 14 tornadoes had touched down in Mississippi and damage from the storm system was reported in at least 24 of the state's 82 counties. Mississippi Gov. Phil Bryant declared a state of emergency — the second one he has declared in less than a week due to tornadoes.

2-wave US flu season is now longest in a decade

NEW YORK — Three months ago, this flu season was shaping up to be short and mild in the U.S. But a surprising second viral wave has made it the longest in 10 years.

This flu season has been officially going for 21 weeks, according to reports collected through last week and released Friday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. That makes it among the longest seen since the government started tracking flu season duration more than 20 years ago.

Some experts likened the unusual double waves to having two different flu seasons compressed, back-to-back, into one. "I don't remember a season like this," said Dr. Arnold Monto, a University of Michigan researcher who had been studying respiratory illnesses

flu season was 20 weeks, which occurred in 2014-2015.

Flu can cause a miserable, relatively mild illness in many people and a more severe illness in others. Young children and the elderly are at greatest risk from flu and its complications.

The current season began the week of Thanksgiving, a typical start time. In the beginning, most illnesses were caused by a flu strain that tends not to cause as many hospitalizations and which is more easily controlled by vaccines.

But in mid-February, a nastier strain started causing

Notre Dame sympathy stirs yellow vest anger

PARIS — French yellow vest protesters set small fires as they marched through Paris on Saturday to drive home their latest message to the government: that rebuilding the fireravaged Notre Dame Cathedral isn't the only problem the nation needs to solve.

Police repeatedly fired tear gas on stone-throwing protesters on the margins of the largely peaceful march, one of several actions around Paris and other French cities. They're marking the 23rd straight weekend of yellow vest action against wealth inequality and President Emmanuel Macron's leadership. Security was extra-high in Paris as authorities braced for resurgent yellow vest anger. The Paris police headquarters said authorities detained 126 people by early afternoon and carried out spot checks of more than 11,000 people trying to enter the capital for Saturday's protests.

The tensions focused on a march of several thousand people that started at the Finance Ministry in eastern Paris to demand lower taxes on workers and pensioners and higher taxes on the rich.

As the crowd headed toward the Place de la Republique plaza in eastern Paris, barricades were set ablaze at multiple spots, and branches set on fire elsewhere. Firefighters quickly responded to extinguish the flames.

An Associated Press reporter saw a masked protester dressed entirely in black jump on a Mercedes parked along the march route, smashing its front and back windshields. Another group of about 200 people tried to march on the president's Elysee Palace in central Paris, but riot police blocked them

Charging documents said the confrontation happened on April 3 when Jones threw trash out of his car. Police said another driver then yelled at Jones to pick up the trash. The document said Jones then fired two shots at the man. He wasn't wounded, although his front tire was damaged.

Jones told investigators the other man threw a cup at his vehicle. He said he only fired because he thought the other man was reaching for a weapon.

Chimp dies after 35 years as alpha female

NC ASHEBORO — The North Carolina Zoo said a 46-year-old chimpanzee has died after 35 years as the dominant female of her group.

Zoo officials said in a news release that the chimp named Maggie was humanely euthanized after health issues including an infection and lung problems. Zookeepers noted she had already lived longer than most female chimpanzees, who typically live to around age 40.

As the alpha female, Maggie built relationships and served as a leader to younger chimps.

County animal control officers removed the animals and took them to the Macomb County Animal Shelter. Most of the animals were sick.

Endangered whale is having mini-baby boom

MA PROVINCETOWN — An endangered species of whale is experiencing a mini-baby boom in New England waters, researchers on Cape Cod said.

The North Atlantic right whale is one of the rarest species of whale on the planet, numbering only about 411. But the Center for Coastal Studies in Provincetown said its aerial survey team spotted two mom and calf pairs in Cape Cod Bay. That brings the number seen in New England waters alone this year to three.

That's big news because the whale's population has been falling, and no calves were seen last year. In all, seven right whale calves have been seen this year.

Beware: 2 coyotes test positive for rabies

BURLINGTON — Vermont health officials said two coyotes tested positive for rabies.

The Vermont Department of Public Health is urging residents near Salisbury and New Haven to avoid animals that are acting sick or aggressive and reach out to local game wardens or animal control officers.

The spokesman said one coyote attacked two people in Salisbury and tests earlier this month showed it was rabid. The other coyote in New Haven and also found it tested positive for rabies.

A spokesman for the department said that rabies among coyotes is relatively rare.

The Eastern hellbender voted official amphibian

PA HARRISBURG — Pennsylvania is getting an official amphibian, a nocturnal, unsightly salamander that's sometimes known as a snot otter, lasagna lizard or mud devil.

The House voted 191-6 to grant the honor to the Eastern hellbender, which can grow to be more than 2 feet long and is battling declining numbers across much of its range in the United States.

The path to legislative recognition was not smooth, as the Eastern hellbender faced a stiff challenge from another amphibian called Wehrle's salamander.

Avs bounce to top Western seed Flames

CALGARY, Alberta — After getting shut out in the series opener, the Colorado Avalanche clamped down defensively to shut down the Western Conference-leading Calgary Flames.

Now, the Avalanche are on to the second round of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

Colin Wilson and Mikko Rantanen each had two goals and an assist, and Colorado beat Calgary 5-1 in Game 5 of their firstround series Friday night to eliminate the Flames.

Gabriel Landeskog also scored, and Nathan MacKinnon and Tyson Barrie each had three assists as the Avalanche won a playoff series for the first time since 2008. Philipp Grubauer stopped 28 shots and a penalty shot by Johnny Gaudreau in the first period.

"It's awesome to win a round," said MacKinnon, who had three goals and five assists in the series. "It's been a while for this organization and I, personally, have never won a round so I'm really excited about it."

T.J. Brodie scored for the Flames, and Mike Smith finished with 27 saves.

Calgary, which finished first in the Western Conference at 50-25-7, was beaten by a team that sprinted the final two weeks of the regular season to capture the West's last wild card and then won four straight in this series after losing the opener.

"Obviously we were the big underdogs and no one picked us to win," MacKinnon said. "I didn't expect to win it in five, but we believed in this group."

Betts and Mitch Moreland hit back-to-back homers for the go-ahead runs in the eighth inning and the struggling Red Sox beat the MLB-best Tampa Bay Rays 6-4.

"A lot of emotions going through my head there, but the main thing is it put us ahead," Betts said. "It's just one (game), but it's definitely a starting point. The main thing is I helped in some way today, and that's kind of my viewpoint on playing."

With the game tied at 4, Betts hit a leadoff shot off Diego Cas-

tillo (0-2) and Moreland connected three pitches later.

"You're talking about two pretty talented hitters," Rays manager Kevin Cash said. "Not surprising if you don't locate it or command it the way you want, they can make you pay."

Betts finished 2-for-4 and raised his batting average from .200 to .216. Last season, the Red Sox outfielder hit a big league-leading .346 with 32 homers and 80 RBIs on his way to the MVP award.

Christian Vazquez also homered and Brandon Workman (1-1) went $1^2/3$ scoreless innings for the Red Sox, who are 7-13 and trail the AL East-leading Rays by seven games. Ryan Brasier worked the ninth to pick up his fourth save.

"The standings?" Boston

manager Alex Cora said. "We know where we're at, but it's more about we've got two shots to win the series. That feels good."
