Deadly siege in Somalia ends

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Somalia's security forces ended a deadly siege of a beachfront restaurant in the capital, with more than 20 people killed in the attack, a police official said Friday.

The security forces took control of the restaurant just before dawn, said Capt. Mohamed Hussein, speaking from the scene of the attack in Mogadishu.

It was not clear whether Hussein's report of more than 20 killed included the assailants. Islamic extremist group al-Shabab claimed responsibility for the attack, in a broadcast on its online radio late Thursday.

Volunteers carried bodies

from the scene of the attack early Friday.

"I was intending to go out but suddenly we heard a heavy explosion followed by gunfire. ... I saw a militant fighter shooting indiscriminately on everybody. Then I locked myself inside a room until we were evacuated peacefully by the security forces," said Abdulkadir Mohamed Somow, who had been trapped inside the restaurant.

Blasts and bursts of gunfire could be heard as Somali special forces went from room to room in pursuit of the al-Shabab gunmen who were holed up inside the restaurant.

Hussein said the security forces rescued many people who had been trapped inside the restaurant's hall, where a party was taking place when the attack started on Thursday.

Witnesses said that gunmen entered the restaurant from the direction of the beach. They shouted "Allahu akbar," the Arabic phrase for "God is great," as they attacked.

"They randomly fired at people sitting near the beach before entering the restaurant," said witness Ahmed Nur, who was strolling along the shoreline when the attack happened.

Al-Shabab attacked Kenyan peacekeepers in southwestern Somalia last week. The al-Qaida-linked group said it had killed about 100 Kenyans and seized weapons and military vehicles. The Kenyan government has given no death toll, but said there were some fatalities.

US student arrested in N. Korea

SEOUL, South Korea—North Korea announced Friday the arrest of a U.S. university student for what it called a "hostile act" orchestrated by the American government to undermine the authoritarian nation.

Pyongyang's state media said the University of Virginia student entered the country under the guise of a tourist and plotted to destroy North Korean unity with "the tacit connivance of the U.S. government and under its manipulation."

The North's official Korean Central News Agency said that the student, whom it identified as Warmbier Otto Frederick, was "arrested while perpetrating a hostile act," but didn't say when he was detained or explain the nature of the act. North Korea has sometimes listed Englishlanguage surnames first, in the Korean style. The University of Virginia's online student directory lists someone named Otto Frederick Warmbier as an undergraduate student.

A China-based tour company specializing in travel to North Korea, Young Pioneer Tours, confirmed that one of its customers, identified only as "Otto," had been detained in Pyongyang, the North's capital, but provided no other details. Social media accounts for Warmbier show interests in finance, travel and rap music; he was on the University of Virginia's dean's list and attended high school in the Cincinnati, Ohio, area. The U.S. State Department said in a statement that it was "aware of media reports that a U.S. citizen was detained in North Korea," but had "no further information to share due to privacy considerations."

Iraq's PM doubts 3 Americans kidnapped

BAGHDAD — Iraq's prime minister has expressed doubts that the three Americans who went missing from a Baghdad neighborhood last week have been kidnapped.

Haider al-Abadi said no demands have been made for the three and that they were most likely taken by "criminal gangs." Al-Abadi spoke on Friday from Davos, Switzerland, where he is attending the World Economic Forum.

Separately, Iraqi and Western security officials claimed two powerful Shiite militias — Asaib Ahl al-Haq and Saraya al-Salam — are the top suspects in the abduction. Both officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to talk to reporters. The Iraqi government doesn't

are missing" and Iraqi security forces are searching for them, Abadi said.

The U.S. Embassy in Baghdad has confirmed that an unspecified number of Americans are missing and said it's working with Iraqi authorities to locate them. Baghdad authorities said the Americans were kidnapped from a "suspicious apartment" but provided no other details. There has been no claim of responsibility.

Following the dramatic collapse of the Iraqi security forces in the summer of 2014, Shiite militias filled the vactioned and known as Popular Mobilization Committees.

But many trace their roots to the armed groups that battled U.S. troops after the 2003 invasion and kidnapped and killed Sunnis at the height of Iraq's sectarian bloodletting in 2006 and 2007. In the fight against the Islamic State group, human rights groups have accused the committees of abuses targeting Sunni civilians — charges denied by militia leaders.

Asaib Ahl al-Haq, Iranianbacked and one of the most powerful Shiite militias operating in Iraq, has repeatedly spoken out against the presence of U.S. forces in Iraq in the fight against the Islamic State group. Saraya al-Salam is run by Iraq's influential Shiite cleric, Muqtada al-Sadr, whose Mahdi militia often battled with U.S. forces between 2003 and 2011.

Vets accuse Palin of dangerous stereotyping

During a tour in Iraq, U.S. Army officer Ryan Kranc was traveling on a convoy with his commander when they drove over a roadside bomb. His commander died, and Kranc survived.

That was in 2003. For many years after, Kranc bore the guilt of the incident — until 2009, when he was deployed in Saudi Arabia and decided to get help.

"I came to the realization that I could no longer mask this," Kranc said in a phone interview Friday. "I would pour my heart and soul into my professional life, but I would be a zombie at home."

Kranc was suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder — he prefers to simply call it "post-traumatic stress" — and started seeing a doctor, traveled through Germany and witnessed a leg of the Tour de France.

"It was a personal retreat," Kranc said. "It took me a long time to realize that I wasn't responsible."

Now, the officer, who is currently still serving, shares his story with others in the

hopes of destigmatizing PTSD and challenging the idea that war leaves psychological wounds from which it is impossible to recover. Though the process has been far from perfect, Kranc said, he continues to lead a productive life, and is frustrated by the common perception that veterans can't move forward from their psychological traumas.

This was the message Kranc was trying to get across this week when he responded to Nate Bethea, another veteran, with a string of tweets about how he was affected by PTSD. Unknowingly, he was joining a discussion within the online American veteran community that has been sparked by comments from former Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin.

The one-time Republican vice presidential candidate bolted back into the spotlight with her endorsement of Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump on Tuesday, but a side story that didn't go unnoticed was her son's arrest at her home the day before she threw her support behind the billionaire real estate developer. According to a police affidavit, Palin's son and Iraq combat veteran Track Palin, 26, was arrested on domestic violence charges after his girlfriend, Jordan Loewe, called 911 and said that he was armed and had punched her in the face.

Sarah Palin addressed the incident while stumping for Trump in Tulsa, Okla., on Tuesday.

"When my own son is going through what he goes through coming back, I can certainly relate to the families who ... feel these ramifications of PTSD," she said before an 8,000-strong crowd, The Washington Post's Jose DelReal reported.

In the same speech, Palin accused President Barack Obama of neglecting veterans, adding, "It is now or never for the sake of America's finest that we have a commander-in-chief who will respect them."

The statements angered many veterans, who took to social media to condemn Palin for simplifying their experiences and perpetuating the stereotype of the destructive veteran. Others criticized Palin for placing the blame on Obama.

Marines in Hawaii crash presumed dead

FORT SHAFTER, Hawaii — The Coast Guard has established a temporary safety zone after two Marine Corps helicopters crashed last week, presumably killing 12 Marines.

The safety zone, about three miles off Oahu's North Shore, was established Thursday to clear the way for salvaging underwater debris after the Jan. 14 crash, which remains under investigation.

The Marine Corps said the 12 Marines who were in two helicopters that crashed off Hawaii are considered dead.

An intense, five-day search ended Tuesday without finding a trace of the Marines. The helicopters' four life rafts were found with no sign that they had been used. The safety zone — which will remain in effect through Feb. 10 or until salvage operations are complete — encompasses waters extending a mile in all directions around the location of

the salvage operations, about 3 miles northwest of a small boat harbor in Haleiwa.

No vessel or person is permitted to enter the safety zone without Coast Guard authorization. Violators face penalties of up to \$40,000 for each infraction, or a criminal sentence of up to 25 years and a \$250,000 fine, the Coast Guard said. Vessels may also be seized and held liable for any monetary assessments.

The Marines are heading the salvage work and will continue to search for debris and the remains of the missing.

Capt. James D. Jenkins, Hawaii Coast Guard commander, told reporters Tuesday that a widespread debris field had been found using remotely controlled underwater vehicles. The debris was consistent with what would be found from the helicopters, CH-53E Super Stallions. The helicopters did not have voice recorders or other devices to provide highly detailed information about the crash, which means investigators will have to painstakingly piece together much of the debris.

An aviation mishap board will investigate the cause of the crash and possibly provide recommendations to prevent incidents.

Meanwhile, Marine Corps Base Hawaii will host a memorial service for the 12 Marines at 10 a.m. Friday in hangar 102, according to the 1st Battalion 12th Marines' Facebook page.

While there is "no way to comprehend the grief their families feel today, this we do know: These proud Marines died as they lived, in service to a country they loved and in dedication to a cause greater than themselves," Defense Secretary Ash Carter said in a statement Wednesday.

Efforts by the Coast Guard, Navy, Marines and others to search day and night in rough seas and heavy swells was testimony that "leave no man behind" is "not a simple slogan: It was a solemn oath," he said.

EPA official quits post over Flint water crisis

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. — A regional director of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency resigned in connection with the drinking water crisis in Flint, Mich., the same day the agency's chief issued an emergency order directing state and city officials to take actions to protect public health.

The EPA said in a statement Thursday that Susan Hedman, head of the agency's regional office in Chicago, whose jurisdiction includes Michigan, was stepping down Feb. 1 so it could focus "solely on the restoration of Flint's drinking water."

High levels of lead have been detected in the impoverished city's water since officials switched from the Detroit municipal system and began drawing from the Flint River as a cost-saving measure in April 2014. Some children's blood has tested positive for lead, a potent neurotoxin linked to learning disabilities, lower IQ and behavioral problems.

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Panthers changing reputation

CHARLOTTE, N.C.- The Carolina Panthers have a reputation of being a defensive team.

Cam Newton is changing that perception in his fifth season.

The Panthers (16-1) finished the regular season as the highest-scoring team in the NFL, and have scored at least 27 points in 14 of their last 15 games behind their All-Pro quarterback. On Sunday, the Panthers bolted to a 31-point halftime lead against the Seattle Seahawks and held on to win 31-24 to reach the NFC championship game for the first time since 2005.

The top-seeded Panthers host the Arizona Cardinals (14-3) on Sunday.

It's not exactly what you'd expect from a team whose head coach has a defensive background.

"Not really," coach Ron Rivera said with a laugh when asked if he ever thought he'd be coaching a team that led the league in scoring.

"To see how explosive we have been and the play of our quarterback has been special. I didn't know if we would ever be like."

The growth of Carolina's offense has been a slow, steady journey.

Rivera attributes that to maintaining continuity on the coaching staff over Newton's first five seasons. Although offensive coordinator Rob Chudzinski left after two seasons, the Panthers promoted quarterbacks coach Mike Shula to that role and the rest of the staff has pretty much remained intact since 2011. The Panthers have won three straight NFC South titles and started this season 14-0.

"That has a lot to do with" our success, Rivera said. "These guys have been together a while and it allowed them to have continuity to develop this offense and have it morph into fitting around the quarterback's skillset as opposed to forcing him into what you want to do."

Rivera and his staff extensively studied the things Newton did well at Auburn, where he led the Tigers to a national championship in his only season and won the Heisman Trophy. The coaches worked to incorporate philosophies of the read option, which plays to the skills of the 6foot-5, 250-pound quarterback.

Late last season, Shula went a step further, moving to primarily a no-huddle offense because that is where Newton is most comfortable.

After five years in the system, Newton looks more comfortable and confident in the offense than he ever has before. When the Panthers surrendered a 28-point lead against the New York Giants late in the season, cameras showed Newton calmly shaking his head up and down on the sideline, confident he was going to lead the Panthers to the winning field goal.

He did just that, and the Panthers escaped with a 38-35 win. "With those great quarterbacks you al-

"With those great quarterbacks you always get that sense that they're in control," wide receiver Jerricho Cotchery said. "It's no different with him. We always feel like we're in control because he is our quarterback." Newton said the Panthers don't get nervous.

"We prepared too much to get nervous," Newton said. "In some way, shape or form we played this game numerous times in our head, watched countless film, made this adjustment and that adjustment so when you're put in the fire you already have what you need to do what you do. Nothing else needs to be done or said. No matter if we're up or we're down, just believe in the plan and keep going."

Newton earned All-Pro this season, becoming the first quarterback in NFL history to throw for 35 touchdown passes and run for 10 TDs.

The Panthers offense appeared to be on the verge of breaking out in 2013 when the team finished 12-4 and won the NFC South championship. But Newton struggled with injuries in 2014, missing most of the offseason after surgery on his foot. He later broke his ribs in the preseason and then fractured two ribs in a car wreckk late in the year.

This year, Newton is healthy - and producing.

Cotchery said he has no doubt Newton is ready for the pressure that is ahead in the NFC title game -- and potentially the Super Bowl.

Super Bowl. "Most certainly," Cotchery said. "A lot of people don't like to factor into what a person has done in college and all of those things but he led a team to a national championship and he has been in big moments and has the experience of playing in three straight playoffs.

"He is ready for these moments."

Federer earns 300th Grand Slam victory

MELBOURNE, Australia — Roger Federer was already a long way clear at the top of the list of men with the most wins in Grand Slam singles matches, so becoming the first to 300 wasn't a major distraction.

He reached the milestone at Rod Laver Arena on Friday, when he moved into the fourth round of the Australian Open with a 6-4, 3-6, 6-1, 6-4 victory over Grigor Dimitrov.

"It's very exciting, I must tell you," Federer said of his latest record, adding that reaching 1,000 wins in tour matches last year was also a cause for celebration. "It was a big deal for me.

"Not something I ever aimed for or looked for, but when it happens, it's very special. Yeah, you look deeper into it, I guess, where it's all happened and how. So it's very nice."

Defending champions and top-ranked Serena Williams and Novak Djokovic had night matches starting at the same time on nearby courts.

Six-time champion Williams raced to a 6-1, 6-1 win in 45 minutes over 18-yearold Russian Daria Kasatkina on Rod Laver Arena. She will next play Margarita win the first set against No. 28-seeded Andreas Seppi but had a tougher time in the next two, saving two set points in the tiebreaker before winning 6-1, 7-5, 7-6 (6) on Margaret Court Arena. After making way for Williams on the main court, he noted it was his first match on Melbourne Park's No. 2 court since it was renovated to include a roof.

Djokovic, a five-time Australian Open champion, continued a streak of reaching at least the fourth round at every major since the 2009 French Open. He was also particularly wary of a third-rounder against Seppi, who beat four-time champion Federer at the same stage here last year.

Also advancing were two-time semifinalist Tomas Berdych, who beat No. 29 Nick Kyrgios in four sets, and 2014 U.S. Open finalist Kei Nishikori, who had had a 7-5, 2-6, 6-3, 6-4 win over No. 26-seeded Guillermo Garcia-Lopez and will next play 2008 Australian Open finalist Jo-Wilfried Tsonga. Marin Cilic, the 2014 U.S. Open champion, lost to No. 24 Roberto Bautista Agut 6-4, 7-6 (5), 7-5.

No. 15 David Goffin beat No. 19 Dominic Thiem 6-1, 3-6, 7-6 (2), 7-5 — his first win against a top-20 player at a Grand Slam. of No. 2 Jimmy Connors in Grand Slam singles wins, though Federer's main aim is to win his first major since Wimbledon 2012. He improved to 5-0 against Dimitrov, a

young Bulgarian with a similar style. Dimitrov needed treatment for an undisclosed ailment at times, but Federer didn't cut him any slack — he lost in the third round here last year, his worst run at Melbourne Park since 2001.

Earlier in a rain-interrupted day at Melbourne Park, 2008 champion Maria Sharapova collected her 600th win at the tour level. She advanced with a 6-1, 6-7 (5), 6-0 win over Lauren Davis before she was reminded of the milestone, becoming the 17th woman to reach the mark.

"Wow. I've won 600 matches?" Sharapova said. "I think it's a proud number."

The fifth-seeded Sharapova will next play No. 12 Belinda Bencic, who had a 4-6, 6-2, 6-4 win over Kateryna Bondarenko.

Roberta Vinci, who ended Williams' bid for a calendar-year Grand Slam in 2015 with a shocking semifinal win at the U.S. Open, lost 0-6, 6-4, 6-4 to Anna-Lena Friedsam, who will next face No. 4 Agnieszka Radwanska.

Also progressing were No. 10 Carla Suarez Navarro and Russian-born

Sullivan takes lead with a 67

ABU DHABI, United Arab Emirates – Jordan Spieth, Rory McIlroy and other big names slid off the leaderboard at the weather-affected Abu Dhabi Championship on Friday, leaving American amateur Bryson DeChambeau to chase clubhouse leader Andy Sullivan in the second round.

After fog delayed the start of play by nearly three hours, Sullivan shot a second straight 5-under 67 to move clear on 10-under and make another strong impression in front of his playing partner, European Ryder Cup captain Darren Clarke.

Spieth and McIlroy were in the marquee afternoon group, but both played erratically and were 1 over after 13 holes when play was suspended for the day because of darkness. Spieth was at 3 under and McIlroy at 5 under, with both struggling off the tee.

DeChambeau, the surprise first-round leader following a 64, was a shot behind Sullivan after playing nine holes in 1 under. Starting on No. 10, he made birdies on two of his first three holes but bogeyed No. 18 in the fading light.

Joost Luiten (68) and Rafael Cabrera-Bello (67) were in the clubhouse on 7under 137, with the leaderboard shorn of the tournament's leading players. Henrik Stenson dropped three shots in 12 holes before play was suspended to fall to 4under overall, and Branden Grace was on the same score after shooting 74.

The European Tour said the third round will be a two-tee start, in three balls, to make up for the lost time Friday.

Sullivan, one of the stars of the European Tour in 2015 with three victories, won three points from three matches for Europe in its big win over Asia in the EurAsia Cup in Malaysia last week. Clarke captained the Europeans for that event, a test run for the Ryder Cup, and has been further impressed by Sullivan's play and attitude in Abu Dhabi — this time even closer up.

The 28-year-old Englishman started and finished his second round with three straight birdies. "Darren knows what I can do, so I don't

"Darren knows what I can do, so I don't think it was imperative (to play well here)," Sullivan said, "but it bodes well when you do."

Clarke and Sullivan have been close friends since Sullivan turned professional in 2011 and the jokes have been flying between them this week.

"He has completely taken the mick out of me for two days and I have told him that if he keeps this up, a pick (for the Ryder Cup) is out of the question," Clarke said.

Sullivan, known for his big smile and easygoing attitude, says Clarke has been playfully abusing him for being a "short, fat guy" but has been giving it back.

"He's got 60 on his ball and, on the first tee, I said I didn't realize you put your age on the ball," Sullivan said, laughing. "I just try and have a bit of to-ing and fro-ing. It was good fun and kept it relaxed."

Lightning snap Chicago's streak

TAMPA, Fla. – Anton Stralman insisted the surging Tampa Bay Lightning didn't derive any extra satisfaction out of beating the Chicago Blackhawks to end a franchise-record 12-game winning streak for the defending Stanley Cup champions.

"No, not really," the veteran defenseman said after the Lightning extended a roll of their own to a season-best seven games with a 2-1 victory Thursday night. "It's all about our winning streak now."

Stralman's sixth goal of the sea-son erased an early deficit and Nikita Kucherov snapped a second-period tie with his 20th goal for the Lightning, who will try to match the longest winning streak in club history Saturday at Florida.

'This might have been our best game all season. We played for 60 minutes,' Stralman said. "This is the way we want to play, obviously. This is how we can play."

Ben Bishop had 17 saves as the Blackhawks were held to a season-low 18 shots. Corey Crawford stopped 31 shots to keep the Blackhawks in the game, but it wasn't enough to extend a career-best nine-game winning streak for the Chicago goaltender.

'They were definitely the better team. We didn't generate much. We didn't get much traffic and pucks to the net and didn't get the offensive zone time we like," Blackhawks coach Joel Quenneville said. "We had a few shifts, but they were few and far between."

The victory gave Tampa Bay a split of the season series with the Blackhawks, who won last year's Stanley Cup final against the Lightning in six games.

'That was a fun game. Obviously it brought back memories of last year," Lightning coach Jon Cooper said. "They are a really good team. We played ex-

tremely well to beat them. ... One streak was ending tonight and I'm glad it's theirs

Wild 3, Kings O: Zach Parise scored Minnesota's first power-play goal in January, Darcy Kuemper made 32 saves in his seventh career shutout and the Wild snapped their five-game losing streak.

Erik Haula added a short-handed goal for the Wild, who pulled out of their tailspin with a gritty effort against the Pacific Division leaders. Charlie Coyle scored on a breakaway during a solid offensive performance by a team that had scored just one goal in its previous nine periods.

Sedin scored two goals in Vancouver's 3-2 overtime win against Florida on Jan. 11 to tie Markus Naslund for the franchise lead, but went scoreless in four straight games before Thursday.

Devils 6, Senators 3: Travis Zajac had a goal and three assists, Kyle Palmieri scored twice, and the New Jersey Devils scored five times in the first period in a victory over the Ottawa Senators.

Joseph Blandisi scored his first NHL goal and had two assists. Lee Stempniak and Adam Henrique also scored to help the Devils win their third straight and improve to 6-1-1 in their last eight games against the Senators.

Penguins 4, Flyers 3: Phil Kessel scored twice and Sidney Crosby had a goal and an assist as host Pittsburgh ended an eight-game winless streak against its cross-state rival.

Crosby continued his five-game point

streak for the Penguins, who defeated the Flyers for the first time since Oct. 17, 2013. Phil Kessel scored his 13th and 14th goals of the season and Trevor Daley scored his fourth for the Penguins.

Flames 4, Blue Jackets 2: Rookie Sam Bennett scored twice and Johnny Gaudreau had the tiebreaking goal to lead visiting Calgary past league-worst Columbus.

PISCATAWAY, N.J. - Peter Jok scored a career-high 29 points and No. 9 Iowa shook off pesky Rutgers in the second half in posting a harder-than-expected 90-76 victory on Thursday night.

Having already tied the best start in team history, the Spurs moved to 37-6 and kept pace with the 2010-11 team, which also had a 37-6 mark. They got 66 points from their bench.

The Spurs cruised despite missing starters Tony Parker and Tim Duncan. Parker had right hip soreness and Duncan was given the night off to rest.

Devin Booker's 24 points led the Suns, who lost their sixth straight and 15th in 16 games.
