LA hoping for respite from winds, fires

LOS ANGELES — Firefighters hoped for a break Friday from fierce winds fueling massive blazes in the Los Angeles area that have killed 10 people, obliterated whole neighborhoods and set the nation's second-largest city on edge.

The fires have burned more than 10,000 homes and other structures since Tuesday, when they first began popping up around a densely populated, 25-mile expanse north of downtown Los Angeles. No cause has been identified for the largest fires.

The level of devastation is jarring even in a state that has grown used to massive wildfires. Dozens of blocks of scenic Pacific Palisades were flattened to smoldering rubble. In neighboring Malibu, blackened palm strands were all that was left above debris where oceanfront homes once stood.

Metropolitan LA and its 13 million residents woke up Friday to yet another day of firestoking winds and the threat of

new flareups. But the gusts were expected to diminish by evening and already have died down from earlier in the week, when hurricane-force winds blew embers that ignited hill-sides.

That could give firefighters a chance to make more progress, but meteorologist Rich Thompson warned the break could be short-lived.

"We're looking for a little respite on Friday and Saturday from the Santa Ana winds but then they're going to pick up again Sunday through most of next week," he said Thursday evening.

New blazes have continued to crop up. On Thursday afternoon, the Kenneth Fire started in the San Fernando Valley just 2 miles from a school serving as a shelter for evacuees from another fire. It moved into neighboring Ventura County, but a large and aggressive response by firefighters stopped the flames from spreading.

Only hours before the fire roared to life, officials said they

were encouraged after firefighters aided by calmer winds and help from out-of-state crews saw the first signs of successfully beating back the region's two devastating wildfires

A firefighting plane had to be grounded Thursday after it was struck by a drone flown by a civilian, the Los Angeles County Fire Department said. Nobody was injured. It's a federal crime to fly a drone during firefighting.

Firefighters made gains Thursday at slowing the spread of the major fires, but containment remained far out of reach.

Robert Lara sifted through the remains of his home in Altadena, next to Pasadena, on Thursday with tears in his eyes, hoping to find a safe with a set of earrings that once belonged to his great-great-grandmother.

"All our memories, all our sentimental attachments, things that were gifted from generation to generation are now gone," he said.

The Eaton Fire burning in

that area started Tuesday night and has burned more than 5,000 structures, a term that includes homes, apartment buildings, businesses, outbuildings and vehicles. Firefighters for the first time have made progress containing the Eaton blaze, officials said Friday.

To the west, the fire in Pacific Palisades, the largest burning in the LA area, has destroyed more than 5,300 structures. Firefighters were able to establish the first bit of containment Thursday, but the blaze is already the most destructive in Los Angeles' history.

Crews also knocked down a blaze in the Hollywood Hills with the help of water drops from aircraft. The fire that sparked late Wednesday near the heart of the entertainment industry came perilously close to igniting the famed Hollywood Bowl outdoor concert venue.

At least five churches, a synagogue, seven schools, two libraries, boutiques, bars, restaurants, banks and grocery stores have been burned.

No punishment given in Trump hush money case

NEW YORK — Presidentelect Donald Trump was sentenced Friday in his hush money case, but the judge declined to impose any punishment.

The outcome cements Trump's conviction before he returns to power while freeing him to return to the White House unencumbered by the threat of a jail term or a fine.

Trump's sentence of an unconditional discharge caps a norm-smashing case that saw him charged with 34 felonies.

put on trial for almost two months and convicted by a jury on every count. Yet, the legal detour — and sordid details aired in court of a plot to bury affair allegations — didn't hurt him with voters, who elected him to a second term.

Manhattan Judge Juan M. Merchan could have sentenced the 78-year-old Republican to up to four years in prison. Instead, he chose a sentence that sidestepped thorny constitutional issues by effectively ending the case but assured that

Trump will become the first person convicted of a felony to assume the presidency.

Merchan said that like when facing any other defendant, he must consider any aggravating factors before imposing a sentence, but the legal protection that Trump will have as president "is a factor that overrides all others."

Trump, briefly addressing the court as he appeared virtually from his Florida home, said his criminal trial and conviction has "been a very terrible experience" and insisted he committed no crime.

The hush money case accused Trump of fudging his business' records to veil a \$130,000 payoff to porn actress Stormy Daniels. She was paid, late in Trump's 2016 campaign, not to tell the public about a sexual encounter she maintains the two had a decade earlier.

He says nothing sexual happened between them, and he contends that his political adversaries spun up a bogus prosecution to try to damage him.

Kremlin welcomes possibility of meeting of Trump, Putin

The Kremlin has welcomed President-elect Donald Trump's readiness to meet with Russian President Vladimir Putin, a senior Moscow official said Friday.

Russia attaches no conditions to the possibility of face-to-face talks, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters during a conference call.

Trump said Thursday that "Putin wants to meet" and that a meeting is being set up. He indicated that efforts to end the almost three-year war between Russia and Ukraine were behind the overtures for talks. "We have to get that war over with," Trump said when referring to his possible meeting with Putin.

Trump, who has criticized U.S. aid for Ukraine's war effort, has called Putin "pretty smart" for invading Ukraine and has praised Russia's mili-

tary record in historical conflicts. Putin has been accused of war crimes by the International Criminal Court.

Ukrainian officials are alarmed at the possibility that the U.S., its single biggest donor, could reduce or stop providing aid. Without Western support, its fight against Russia's invasion could be doomed.

The outgoing Biden administration is providing Ukraine with as much military support as it can, including approving a new \$500 million package of weapons, with the aim of putting Ukraine in the strongest position possible for any future negotiations to end the war.

"We are aware that the (Biden) administration will try to leave as difficult legacy in bilateral relations as possible for Trump and his team," Peskov said

Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has said that in any peace negotiation, his country would need assurances about its future protection from Russia, its much bigger neighbor, which has invaded Ukraine twice since the turn of the century. Europe alone cannot provide that guarantee, he said late Thursday.

"European security guarantees are not sufficient for Ukraine that fights such an enemy as Russia. We need joint security guarantees from the U.S. and Europe," Zelenskyy said.

Ukraine is to receive \$2 billion in military aid packages after Thursday's meeting in Germany of senior officials from more than 50 countries that have been supporting Kyiv's war effort, according to Zelenskyv.

Meanwhile, Ukraine has received its first funds from the European Union from frozen Russian assets, Prime Minister Denys Shmyhal said Friday.

NATO sends two ships to watch for sabotage

NATO is increasing its surveillance operations in the Baltic Sea region with two ships deployed to the area following suspected sabotage of undersea cables between Finland and Estonia.

The move was unveiled on Friday by Finland's Foreign Minister Elina Valtonen, who called on policymakers to increase technical surveillance of the area, noting that it is impossible to monitor all submarine activity with ships.

A wider presence in the area by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization has a "calming and stabilizing effect and we are very pleased about the decision," Valtonen told reporters in Helsinki.

The decision comes after Finland retrieved the anchor of a tanker, Eagle S, from the seabed as it probes aggravated criminal mischief and aggravated interference of communications in the cable breach incident that happened in late December. The vessel, sailing under the Cook Islands flag, has been identified as a member of the so-called shadow fleet transporting Russian petroleum products.

The incident is the third in about 15 months in which a ship anchor has ruptured underwater infrastructure in the Baltic Sea, and prompted Estonia to send its own military vessel to patrol one of two subsea electricity cables with Finland in late December.

Finland and Estonia are cohosting a summit with NATO members from around the Baltic Sea in Helsinki on Tuesday to discuss measures to secure critical assets on the seabed.

Court backs White House effort to block plea deal for accused 9/11 mastermind

WASHINGTON—The Biden administration succeeded Thursday in temporarily blocking accused 9/11 mastermind Khalid Sheikh Mohammed from entering a guilty plea in a deal that would spare him the risk of execution for al-Qaida's Sept. 11, 2001, attacks.

It is the latest development in a long struggle by the U.S. military and successive administrations to bring to justice the man charged with planning one of the deadliest attacks ever on the United States. It stalls an attempt to wrap up two decades of military prosecution beset by legal and logistical troubles.

A three-judge appeals panel agreed to put on hold Mohammed's guilty plea scheduled for Friday in a military commission courtroom at the U.S. naval base in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

In an unusual move, the Biden administration is pushing to throw out a plea agreement that its own Defense Department had negotiated with Mohammed and two 9/11 co-defendants. Mohammed is accused of developing and directing the plot to crash hijacked airliners into the World Trade Center

and the Pentagon.

A small number of relatives of some of the nearly 3,000 victims already had gathered in Guantanamo to hear Mohammed take responsibility in one of the most painful chapters in American history.

"It's very upsetting," said Elizabeth Miller, who lost her fire-fighter father, Douglas Miller, in the attacks and leads a group of 9/11 families supporting the plea agreements and opposing execution for the defendants. She sees the deals as "the best way for families to receive finality."

Judge throws out Biden's Title IX rules

WASHINGTON—The Biden administration's Title IX rules expanding protections for LGBTQ+ students have been struck down nationwide after a federal judge in Kentucky found they overstepped the president's authority.

In a decision issued Thursday, U.S. District Judge Danny C. Reeves scrapped the entire 1,500-page regulation after deciding it was "fatally" tainted by legal shortcomings. The rule had already been halted in 26 states after a wave of legal challenges by Republican states.

President-elect Donald Trump, whose inauguration is days away, previously promised to end the rules "on day one" and made antitransgender themes a centerpiece of his campaign.

The decision came in response to a lawsuit filed by Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Virginia and West Virginia.

Tennessee Attorney General Jonathan Skrmetti called it a rejection of the Biden administration's "relentless push to impose a radical gender ideology."

"Because the Biden rule is vacated altogether, President Trump will be free to take a fresh look at our Title IX regulations when he returns to office," Skrmetti said in a statement.

The Education Department did not immediately comment on the decision.

Some civil rights groups called the ruling a step backward. GLAAD, a leading LGBTQ+ advocacy group, said transgender and nonbinary students are among the most bullied and harassed.

"Protections for the most vulnerable students make the entire school safer and stronger for everyone," said Sarah Kate Ellis, president and CEO of GLAAD.

The Biden administration ignited controversy when it finalized the new rules last year. The regulation expanded Title IX, a 1972 law forbidding discrimination based on sex in education, to also prevent discrimination based on gender identity or sexual orientation. It also widened the definition of harassment to include a broader range of action.

Civil rights advocates hailed it as a victory, saying it gave LGBTQ+ students new recourse against discrimination. But it drew outrage from conservatives who said it could be used to protect transgender athletes in girls' sports.

The rule didn't explicitly address athletics and mostly detailed how schools and colleges were required to respond to cases of discrimination and sexual assault. A separate proposal dealing with transgender athletes in sports was put on the back burner and later revoked after it became a focal point of Trump's campaign.

In his decision, Reeves found the Education Department

overstepped its authority by expanding the scope of Title IX. There's nothing in the 1972 law suggesting that it should cover any more than it has since Congress created it, Reeves wrote. He called it an "attempt to bypass the legislative process and completely transform Title IX."

The judge also found that it violated free speech rights by requiring teachers to use pronouns aligning with a student's gender identity.

"The First Amendment does not permit the government to chill speech or compel affirmance of a belief with which the speaker disagrees in this manner," Reeves wrote.

Rather than carve out certain aspects of the rule, Reeves decided it was best to toss the regulation in its entirety and revert to a previous interpretation of Title IX. He said his decision will "simply 'cause a return to the status quo' that existed for more than 50 years prior to its effective date."

Court denies bid to block release of Trump report

WASHINGTON — A federal appeals court on Thursday denied a bid to block the public release of special counsel Jack Smith's report on President-elect Donald Trump's efforts to overturn his 2020 election loss.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals turned down a emergency challenge aimed at keeping under wraps the report expected to detail unflattering revelations about Trump's failed effort to cling to power in the election he lost to President Joe Biden.

A separate volume of the same special counsel report — related to Trump's hoarding of classified documents at his Mar-a-Lago estate — will not become public while the case

against two co-defendants of the president-elect remains pending, the Justice Department has said.

Even with the appeals court ruling, though, the election interference report will not immediately be released, and there's no guarantee it will be as more legal wrangling is expected. A lower court ruling from Trump-appointed U.S. District Judge Aileen Cannon in Florida temporarily blocking the Justice Department from releasing the report remains in place for three days.

The defendants may now ask Cannon to rule on the merits of their request to block the report, which she did not do earlier when she granted their emergency motion.

Democrats work with GOP to advance migrant bill

WASHINGTON — Newly in the minority, Democrats voted with Republicans on Thursday to advance legislation that would require federal authorities to detain unauthorized immigrants who have been accused of certain crimes.

The Democrats' moves signals that they will try and find spots to work with President-elect Donald Trump while simultaneously trying to block much of his agenda.

Senate Democratic Leader Chuck Schumer and most other Democrats voted to proceed with the legislation, advancing the bill 84-9.

Trump and Republicans have pushed the bill and made it a priority since Georgia nurs-

ing student Laken Riley was killed last year by a Venezuelan man who entered the U.S. illegally and was allowed to stay to pursue his immigration case.

Still, Schumer hasn't promised to vote for the final bill—and he made clear that Democrats want Republicans to work with them on bipartisan amendments.

Thursday's procedural vote will allow that process to begin.

On the Senate floor ahead of the vote, Schumer said that new Majority Leader John Thune, R-S.D., "has said he wants to make the Senate a place where all members should have a chance to make their voices heard. This bill would be a fine place to start."

S. Korean presidential security US added chief quits in wake of standoff

SEOUL, South Korea — South Korea's acting leader on Friday accepted the resignation of the chief of the presidential security service, Park Jongjoon, as he faced police questioning over how his forces blocked law enforcement efforts to detain impeached President Yoon Suk Yeol last week.

The acting leader, Deputy Prime Minister Choi Sang-mok, also expressed regret over the clashes between law enforcement officials and the presidential security service and called for lawmakers to reach a bipartisan agreement to launch an independent investigation.

The Corruption Investigation Office for High-Ranking Officials and police are planning a second attempt to bring Yoon into custody as they jointly investigate whether his brief martial law declaration on Dec. 3 amounted to an attempted rebellion.

The presidential security service blocked an earlier attempt to detain Yoon at his official residence, which he has not left for

It wasn't immediately clear how Park's resignation and Choi's call for an independent investigation to take over the probe on Yoon would affect the push to bring Yoon into custody.

"The government has been deliberating to find a wise solution, but unfortunately, within our current legal framework, it's difficult to find a clear resolution to end the conflict between the two agencies," Choi said about the tensions between the anti-corruption office and presidential security service over Yoon's potential detention.

"We urge the ruling and opposition parties to work together to agree on a bill to launch a special prosecutor investigation that is free from constitutional issues. This will naturally resolve the ongoing intense standoff."

The main liberal opposition Democratic Party accused Choi of legitimizing Yoon's refusal to comply with a court-issued warrant under the guise of neutrality.

"It amounts to a public declaration of support for the leader of a rebellion," said Noh Jongmyun, a party lawmaker and spokesperson.

The Democrats and other opposition parties on Thursday introduced a bill calling for an independent investigation into allegations of rebellion against Yoon.

An earlier bill by the opposition proposing an independent investigation was scrapped after members of Yoon's conservative party opposed a clause allowing only opposition parties to recommend special prosecutor candidates.

256K jobs last month

WASHINGTON — U.S. hiring picked up unexpectedly in December as employers added a strong 256,000 jobs, another sign of the economy's resilience in the face of high interest rates.

Job growth rose 212,000 last month from November, the Labor Department reported Friday.

For all of 2024, the economy added 2.2 million jobs, a solid number but down from 3 million in 2023, 4.5 million in 2022 and a record 6.4 million in 2021 as the economy bounded back from massive pandemic layoffs.

The monthly numbers beat forecasters' expectation around 155,000 new jobs and 4.2% unemployment.

Health care companies added 46,000 jobs, retailers 43,000 and government agencies at the federal, state and local levels, 33,000. But manufacturers cut 13,000 jobs.

Storm plods into South, sparking emergency declarations

DALLAS — A powerful winter storm that dumped heavy snow and glazed roads with ice across much of Texas and Oklahoma lumbered eastward into southern U.S. states Friday, prompting governors to declare states of emergency and shuttering schools across the region.

Arkansas Gov. Sarah Sanders mobilized the National Guard to help stranded motorists. School was canceled for millions of children across a wide tract of southern states from Texas to Georgia and as far east as South Carolina.

Some of the heaviest snowfall was expected Friday across the northern half of Arkansas and much of Tennessee, with totals in some parts of those states

ranging from 6 to 9 inches, according to the National Weather Service.

Farther south and east into Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama, a wintry mix of sleet and freezing rain made travel treacherous.

The storm dumped as much as 7 inches in some spots in central Oklahoma and northern Texas before pushing into Ar-

Snow that began falling in metro Atlanta before dawn led to hundreds of flights being canceled and hundreds more delayed at Atlanta's airport, according to flight tracking software FlightAware. With radar showing much of the heaviest precipitation in Georgia concentrated in a band near Atlan-

ta's airport, controllers declared a ground stop before 8 a.m., meaning no planes could land or take off. Atlanta, a major hub for Delta Air Lines, is the world's busiest airport. Gov. Brian Kemp declared a state of emergency for Georgia.

Other airports with significant delays and cancellations included those in Charlotte, N.C., Dallas-Fort Worth and Nashville.

The polar vortex of ultracold air usually spins around the North Pole, but it sometimes ventures south into the U.S., Europe and Asia. Some experts say such events are happening more frequently, paradoxically, because of a warming world.

Paul Kirkwood, a National Weather Service meteorologist,

said the storm that swept through the Dallas area will create a "swath of snow" impacting parts of Mississippi, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, North Carolina and South Carolina.

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott urged residents to avoid driving if possible. Roads could be dangerous as 75,000 fans were expected Friday at AT&T Stadium in Arlington for the college football championship semifinal between Texas and Ohio State in the Cotton Bowl.

As much as 8 inches of snow could fall in parts of Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee and West Virginia through Saturday, the weather service said. Snow and ice were likely to accumulate across metro Atlanta on Friday.

Late pick, field goal give Irish title shot

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — Penn State quarterback Drew Allar said he was trying to throw the ball into the ground. Notre Dame defensive back Christian Gray dove for it anyway and — luck of the Irish — the ball ended up right in his hands.

A few seconds later, Gray and Notre Dame found themselves with a spot in the national title game after a thrill-a-minute 27-24 victory Thursday night in the Orange Bowl.

Gray's snag of Allar's ill-advised pass across the middle at the Penn State 42 with 33 seconds left, set up a 19-yard drive that ended with Mitch Jeter's winning 41-yard field goal.

The Irish (14-1), seeded seventh in this, the first 12-team college playoff, will have a chance to bring home their 12th title and first since 1988 on Jan. 20 in Atlanta. Their opponent will be the winner Friday night of the Texas-Ohio State semifinal in the Cotton Bowl.

"Just catch the ball. Just catch the ball," Gray said about his interception. "That was going through my mind and I knew I was going to make a play."

Allar explained he saw his first two options covered on the play, then wanted to throw the ball into the dirt. But the throw, under pressure and across his body, didn't have enough zip on it to reach either receiver Omari Evans or the ground before Gray slid in.

"Honestly, I was trying to 'dirt' it at his feet," said the junior quarterback. "I should've thrown it away when I saw the first two progressions were not open. I didn't execute."

It was the most memorable play of a game that was the best of what's been a sleepy few weeks of playoff football. It featured three ties and three lead changes, along with 31 points in the fourth quarter alone.

In the final, Irish coach Marcus Freeman will try to become

the first Black coach to win the title at college football's highest level. Freeman, whose mother is South Korean, also is the first coach of Asian heritage to get this far.

"We found a way to make a play when it mattered the most," Freeman said. "In my opinion, great teams, great programs, find a way to do that."

Penn State coach James Franklin fell to 4-20 with the Nittany Lions against teams ranked in the AP Top 10. The sixth-seeded Nittany Lions ended the season at 13-3.

"Everyone wants to look at a specific play," Franklin said. "But there's probably eight to 12 plays in that game that could have made a difference. I'm not going to call out specific plays or specific players. There are a ton of plays where we could have done better."

Notre Dame quarterback Riley Leonard shook off a hit late in the second quarter that sent him to the medical tent to be checked for a concussion. He came back and led the Irish on four scoring drives in the second half, including the last one.

"He's a competitor and competitors find a way to win, and that's what Riley does," Freeman said.

Leonard finished with 223 yards passing, including a key 10-yard dart to Jaden Greathouse to convert third-and-3 on the last drive. Leonard also had 35 yards rushing, and passed and ran for a score each.

With 4:38 left in the game, the senior quarterback hit Greathouse for a 54-yard score to tie it at 24 after a defender slipped.

The game started slow, but Riley's injury injected some life. He led Notre Dame on TD drives of 75 and 72 yards in the third quarter to lead 17-10.

Penn State had its chances, and Allar, considered a first-round pick by some if he leaves for the NFL, will spend the offseason reliving that last throw—or trying to forget it.

NFL moves Vikings-Rams playoff game to Arizona

LOS ANGELES — The NFL has moved the Rams' wild-card playoff game against the Minnesota Vikings to Arizona after days of devastating wildfires in the Los Angeles area.

The game will be played Monday night at State Farm Stadium, the home of the Arizona Cardinals, in suburban Glendale.

The league announced the decision Thursday, a few hours after yet another fire broke out in an area several miles from the Rams' training complex in the

Woodland Hills neighborhood. The Rams canceled the post-practice media availability for their players to allow everyone to get home quickly.

In a brief statement, the league said the decision was made "in the interest of public safety."

Los Angeles has been besieged by multiple wildfires all week following two days of extraordinary wind across the vast metropolitan area. The newest fire triggered an evacuation order in West Hills, a suburban neighborhood directly northwest of the Rams' complex. The Kenneth Fire ballooned in size — charring over a square mile — within hours of igniting.

More than 10,000 structures burned in the two largest fires, the Palisades Fire in Pacific Palisades and the Eaton Fire near Pasadena.

While none of the fires was burning near SoFi Stadium in Inglewood — which is southwest of downtown Los Angeles — the NFL opted to move the game amid concerns about air quality, the strain put on the community and the possible demands on police and fire department personnel.

The Rams and the Los Angeles Chargers — who will play a wild-card game at Houston on Saturday — both practiced outdoors this week, but both teams' coaches were concerned about the air quality, with Chargers coach Jim Harbaugh cutting his players' normal outdoor time in half.

The Rams will travel to Phoenix on Friday after their early-afternoon practice, the team confirmed late Thursday.

Oregon rallies late to beat Ohio State

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Jackson Shelstad scored 24 points and made two free throws with seven seconds left as No. 15 Oregon rallied late to beat Ohio State 73-71 on Thursday night.

Nate Bittle had 21 points, eight rebounds and three blocks for Oregon (14-2, 3-2 Big Ten), which took a 70-67 lead on TJ Bamba's shot in the lane with 40 seconds left. After Ohio State scored, Shelstad was trapped in the corner and turned it over, leading to two free throws by freshman John Mobley Jr. to give the Buckeyes a 71-70 lead with 12.6 seconds to play.

Shelstad raced the other way for a quick shot, and he was fouled before making two free throws to give Oregon a one-

point lead. Bruce Thornton had a decent look at a 3-pointer from the top of the key, but it was short and Bittle secured the rebound.

Thornton led Ohio State (10-6, 2-3) with 20 points and Mobley had 16.

■ No. 16 Michigan State 88, Washington 54: Jaden Akins scored 20 points and No. 16 Michigan State extended its winning streak to eight games by rolling past Washington.

Jeremy Fears Jr. had his first career double-double with 12 points and 10 assists for Michigan State (14-2, 4-0 Big Ten), which pulled even with archrival Michigan for the conference lead. Jase Richardson scored 12 points and Tre Holloman added 11 points and six assists.

The Spartans didn't allow a basket for more than 10 minutes to begin the game and led 42-13 at halftime.
