Manhunt begins as France mourns

PARIS — French police put out a photo of a fugitive in the Paris attacks on Sunday, saying the suspect is on the run and too dangerous for anyone outside law enforcement to engage directly.

Police identified the man suspected of renting the car that delivered attackers to the Bataclan concert hall as Salah Abdeslam, a 26-year-old born in Brussels. “Do not intervene yourself,” warns the message issued Sunday evening.

Abdeslam is thought to be directly involved in Friday’s attacks, which killed 129 people and wounded hundreds in the worst violence in France in decades, French security officials said.

He is one of three brothers believed to be involved in the killings; one was arrested in Belgium and another died in the attack, the first official said.

Abdeslam rented the black Volkswagen Polo used by the group of hostage-takers that left at least 89 people dead inside the Bataclan, another official said. Both spoke on condition of anonymity because the investigation is ongoing.

Seven people were detained Sunday in Belgium in connection with the deadly attacks in Paris as the city entered three days of mourning those killed.

French troops deployed by the thousands and tourist sites were shuttered in one of the most visited cities on Earth as more details of the investigation emerged.

The Islamic State group claimed responsibility for Friday’s gun and bomb attacks on a stadium, a concert hall and

Leaders at G-20 pledge renewed militant fight

ANTALYA, Turkey — Jolted to attention by a horrifying terrorism spree in Paris, world leaders pledged a renewed fight Sunday against the Islamic State group but offered little in the way of a revamped counterterrorism strategy.

Instead, President Barack Obama sought to encourage his allies in the fight to intensify the types of efforts that thus far have proven unsuccessful in routing the extremist threat.

Huddling in Turkey, a front-line state in the war against the Islamic State group, leaders from the Group of 20 summit denounced the attacks with towering rhetoric that reflected growing concern that the extremist group is now set on inflicting violence far beyond Iraq and Syria. Obama said that “the skies have been darkened” by the attack that killed at least 129 in Paris, while Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan

deemed it a strike “against the whole of humanity.”

“The killing of innocent people, based on a twisted ideology, is an attack not just on France, not just on Turkey, but it’s an attack on the civilized world,” Obama said after meeting with Erdogan as he opened two days of talks in this seaside city just a few hundred miles from the Syrian border.

The global war against the militant group overtook all other planned topics for the G-20 economic summit, which brings together leading rich and developing nations to discuss heady topics like global economic growth. Instead, leaders vacillated between discussions of how best to defeat the Islamic State group and how to deal with the migrant crisis stemming from Syria’s civil war.

Absent from the talks was French President Francois Hollande. He canceled his trip after the elaborately coordinated assault on a stadium, a concert hall and cafes in the French capital.

Paris cafes that also wounded 350 people, 99 of them seriously.

As many as three of the seven suicide bombers who died in the attacks were French citizens, as was at least one of the men arrested in neighboring Belgium.

A French police official said a suicide attacker identified by a skin sample was believed to be

living in the Paris suburbs before the attacks. A Belgian official said two of the seven people wired with suicide vests were French men living in Brussels, and among those arrested was another French citizen living in the Belgian capital.

The new information stoked fears of homegrown terrorism in a country that has exported more jihadis than any other

in Europe. All three gunmen in the January attacks on the Charlie Hebdo newspaper and a kosher supermarket in Paris were French.

This time, three teams of attackers were involved and seven suicide bombers blew themselves up — three near the stadium, three at the concert hall and one not far from it, authorities said.

A Brussels parking ticket found inside the Volkswagen Polo parked outside the Bataclan concert hall led to one of the men arrested in Belgium, according to a French police official.

Three Kalashnikovs were found inside the other car known to have been used in the attacks, a Seat found in Montreuil, a suburb nearly 4 miles east of the French capital, according to the police official, who could not be named because the investigation is ongoing.

Another official in Belgium said the seven people detained would learn later Sunday whether they would be held in custody longer. Three other people were arrested there Saturday.

That official, who spoke on condition of anonymity due to the ongoing investigation, also said two of the seven attackers who died in Paris on Friday night were French men living in Brussels. He said one was living in the Molenbeek neighborhood, which is considered a focal point for religious extremism and fighters going to Syria.

Security was heightened across France, across Europe’s normally open borders, even across the ocean in New York, and how to respond to the Paris attacks became a key point among U.S. Democratic presidential hopefuls at a debate Saturday night.

LCS program still controversial

MILWAUKEE — As the latest U.S. Navy littoral combat ship sailed into Milwaukee this past weekend, ahead of its commissioning on the city's lakefront this Saturday, critics say the \$400 million vessels still haven't met expectations.

The Marinette Marine Corp. shipyard in Marinette, Wis., employs about 2,000 people building the ships, which are designed for a variety of missions, including combat in shallow, coastal waters.

Defense contractor Lockheed Martin Corp., through Marinette, has delivered three of the ships to the Navy: the USS Freedom, the USS Fort Worth and the USS Milwaukee, which is expected to arrive in Milwaukee on Saturday.

Six more of the warships are in various stages of construction in Marinette, while a different version is being built in Mobile, Ala. Altogether, the Navy wants 52 of the vessels, and foreign

navies have shown interest in purchasing them.

Yet critics say the 380-foot ships haven't lived up to promises in some key areas, such as the ability to quickly swap out combat modules for missions that include searching for underwater mines and engaging in battle with other ships.

The interchangeable modules are supposed to make the ships more versatile, with each version tailored for a specific purpose such as mine sweeping or hunting submarines. The original goal was to be able to change the modules in 72 hours.

In practice, the "plug-and-play" concept isn't working, said Dakota Wood, senior research fellow for defense programs at The Heritage Foundation, a conservative think tank in Washington.

"It was an idea that, I think, is not supported by current technology. The practicality of doing this seems a bridge too far," Wood said.

Another naval expert critical of the littoral combat ship program is Norman Polmar, who has been an adviser or consultant to three U.S. secretaries of the Navy and two chiefs of naval operations.

Polmar said the program was an interesting concept that was poorly executed. He's very critical of the delays in developing the mission modules and what he says are shortcomings in the ships' weapons.

"The problem is the ships' capabilities are virtually nil. The Navy was just stupid in the way they executed the program," Polmar said.

The next version of the ships, which goes into production in about 2019 for 20 vessels, will be less reliant on the interchangeable combat modules. It's also supposed to have improved defense systems, an improved air-surveillance radar and more powerful weapons including surface-to-surface missiles.

US sailors set to begin drill with Japan

YOKOSUKA NAVAL BASE, Japan — About 7,000 sailors will operate with the Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force during Annual Exercise 2015, which is set to begin Monday in waters south of Japan.

The bilateral exercise, which is scheduled to run through Nov. 25, will test surface, undersea and air combat operations, U.S. 7th Fleet officials said Friday.

The aircraft carrier USS Ronald Reagan and its embarked air wing will participate, officials said.

The guided-missile cruisers USS Antietam and USS Chancellorsville, as well as the destroyers USS Curtis Wilbur, USS Benfold and USS Mustin, are also scheduled to take part, along with patrol aircraft, a submarine and personnel from several staff commands.

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Democratic debate focuses on foreign policy amid anxiety

WASHINGTON — With the country still reeling from deadly terrorist attacks in Paris, Hillary Rodham Clinton cast herself as America's strongest leader, even as she found herself forced to defend her own role during the rise of the Islamic State group.

"This election is not only about electing a president, it's also about choosing our next commander in chief," Clinton said Saturday night in the Democrats' second presidential debate. "All of the other issues we want to deal with depend upon us being secure and strong."

Amid the backdrop of global anxiety, Clinton found herself fending off questions about not only her foreign policy record but her economic ties, with both Vermont Sen. Bernie Sand-

ers and former Maryland Gov. Martin O'Malley painting the former New York senator as a lackey for Wall Street and corporate interests.

"Let's not be naive about it," said Sanders, noting Clinton collected millions in campaign donations from Wall Street bankers. "They expect to get something. Everybody knows that."

The barbs marked a far more aggressive shift in a primary race that has so far been notable for its civility. For example, Clinton faced criticism of her national security record when Sanders traced the current instability in the Middle East to the Senate's vote — including Clinton's — to authorize military action in Iraq in 2002. He said that that U.S. invasion "unraveled the region."

Study shows black Americans more likely to face police threat of force

Black Americans are more than twice as likely as white Americans to experience non-fatal force or the threat of force from police, according to a new Justice Department study.

The study, which was released Saturday, found that an annual average of 44 million U.S. residents older than 16 had at least one face-to-face contact with police between 2002 and 2011. About 75 percent of those who had encountered force from the police perceived the force to be excessive.

For the purpose of the study, nonfatal force by police officers was defined as anything from shouting and cursing to using an electroshock weapon or pointing a gun. The report "looks at the characteristics of incidents involving force, including the type of contact,

type of force used, and whether the contact involved a personal search."

Of those who had any type of police-initiated contact, a higher percentage of black people than white people or Hispanics experienced the use of nonfatal force during a routine street stop or when the police were investigating a crime.

Such police-initiated stops accounted for more than half of the face-to-face contacts in the study. Among those police-initiated situations, the researchers said, being stopped on the street was more likely to lead to the use of nonlethal force than being stopped in a vehicle.

The authors of the report examined the prevalence and the circumstances of incidents in which police used nonfatal force and explored whether those factors varied across race.

Holm KOs champion Rousey

MELBOURNE, Australia — Ronda Rousey was the UFC's unstoppable force until Holly Holm used the former champion's aggression against her to produce one of the sport's biggest upsets.

Rousey chased Holm around the ring at UFC 193 on Sunday — looking for the right hold and taking head shots along the way — until Holm saw an opening 59 seconds into the second round and snapped a kick to the head that immediately dropped her more fancied opponent to the canvas.

Holm (10-0) jumped on the prone Rousey, delivering several blows to her head before the referee intervened, ending Rousey's 12-fight unbeaten run and handing Holm the bantamweight title.

An ecstatic Holm jumped around the ring while Rousey stayed on the canvas as she received medical treatment amid the roar of a stunned, record UFC crowd.

"She's won a lot of fights and imposed her will on a lot of fighters," Holm said. "So I expected her to be aggressive and impose her will on me."

"She had me on the cage for a minute and obviously she was trying in for a take down right there ... she had a lot of things she was trying so I'm just glad I put in the practice," she added.

Rousey, a former judo Olympian, was unbeaten through 12 UFC fights before meeting Holm, and a win would have been her seventh title defense. Instead, Holm, a 34-year-old veteran female boxer from Albuquerque, New Mexico, has the championship belt.

"We figured her aggression was coming, if it didn't that's OK, but with footwork and my career we figured she wouldn't give me that space," Holm said. "There's been a lot of blood, sweat and tears but it was all worth it."

Rousey left the stadium to receive treatment for concussion and facial cuts at a nearby hospital after the loss and skipped the post-fight media conference.

"She was transported (to hospital) because she got knocked out," UFC chief Dana White said. "Obviously she's completely bummed out and depressed."

White said a rematch between Holm and Rousey made "a lot of sense" and would put other potential matchups on the backburner.

"Obviously we don't make fights the night of the fight, but the rematch makes a lot of sense," he said. "The rematch is what the people want to see."

In the other title bout, a bloodied Joanna Jedrzejczyk outlasted Valerie Letourneau to successfully defend her straw-weight belt in a five-round slugfest.

Jedrzejczyk (11-0) won a unanimous points decision over Letourneau (8-4) who offered the champion one of her tougher fights in some time.

The six-time Muay Thai world champion Jedrzejczyk started to pressure her opponent from the second round with some trademark, lightning-quick combinations to Letourneau's head, while forcing the challenger to keep her distance with some effective kicks.

Organizers announced a crowd of 56,214 at Melbourne's Etihad Stadium, which

normally hosts Australian rules football matches. The mark eclipsed the 55,724 fans who attended UFC 129 at Toronto's Rogers Centre in 2011.

Rousey, 28, has taken UFC by storm since her debut in 2012 and her success has led to several movie projects as well as the publishing of her autobiography.

But it was Holm's calm confidence and the manner of her win that attracted all the attention Sunday.

"Tonight was one of those moments," White said. "These are the moments in fighting that make it so crazy and so fun. Tonight was one of those moments."

White said that while most onlookers were shocked by Rousey's loss, he was not one of them.

"At the end of the day I made this fight. I said this was a good fight," he said. "Holly was the right fight. Ronda had never faced anybody who uses the range and distance the way she does."

"This woman has four times more fights than Ronda does. She's been a world champion," he said.

In other fights on the undercard, Mark Hunt of New Zealand (11-10-1) won his rematch with Brazil's Antonio Silva (19-8) by technical knockout after the referee stopped the feature heavyweight bout in the first round.

New Zealand-born Australian middleweight Robert Whittaker (16-4) earned a gutsy win on points over Uriah Hall (13-6), while Jared Rosholt (14-2) won a unanimous decision of towering Dutchman Stefan Struve (30-8) in a scrappy opening heavyweight bout of the main card.

Cavaliers fall in 2OT

MILWAUKEE — Jerryd Bayless scored 17 points and held LeBron James scoreless for the final 3:15 of the second overtime, and the Milwaukee Bucks beat Cleveland 108-105 on Saturday night, snapping the Cavaliers' eight-game winning streak.

James scored 37 points for Cleveland, which lost for the first time since dropping a 97-95 decision at Chicago in the season opener on Oct. 27.

Michael Carter-Williams scored 17 points for Milwaukee while Giannis Antetokounmpo had 16 points and 11 rebounds in 45 minutes before fouling out with 3:15 left in the second overtime. Greg Monroe scored 16 points and had 17 rebounds for the Bucks.

Bayless drew the assignment of guarding James after Antetokounmpo fouled out, and he held the Cleveland star scoreless the rest of the game.

"As great as he is, I'm going to try to make it as tough as possible for him," Bayless said of guarding James. "That was my mentality going into it."

Warriors 107, Nets 99 (OT): Stephen Curry scored 21 of his 34 points after half-time, Andre Iguodala hit a clutch three-pointer and host Golden State survived in overtime.

Iguodala added 18 points for the Warriors, who won their 11th straight to start the season. Andrew Bogut had 10 points and 18 rebounds.

Draymond Green recorded a triple-double with 16 points, 12 assists and 10 rebounds. Harrison Barnes added 13 points.

Clippers 101, Pistons 96: At Los Angeles, Blake Griffin scored 34 points, including a crucial jumper with 17 seconds left, and the Clippers rallied to end a two-game skid.

Jamal Crawford added a season-high 37 points, making all 10 of his free throws, and DeAndre Jordan had 10 points and 16 rebounds for the Clippers, who were without injured starters Chris Paul and J.J. Redick.

Wizards 108, Magic 99: Kris Humphries scored 23 points and Garrett Temple matched his career high with 18 points to help host Washington end a three-game losing streak.

Humphries made a career-high five three-pointers, including one with 4:45 remaining as part of an 8-0 Washington run for a 94-90 lead.

Spurs 92, 76ers 83: LaMarcus Aldridge had 17 points and 19 rebounds to help host San Antonio hand Philadelphia its 10th straight loss to open their season and 20th overall dating back to last season.

Tony Parker scored 16 points and Tim Duncan added 15 for San Antonio, which has won four straight and is 3-0 at home.

Suns 105, Nuggets 81: Eric Bledsoe scored 30 points, and host Phoenix cruised past Denver.

Tyson Chandler added 11 points and eight rebounds as Phoenix stopped Denver's three-game winning streak.

Mavericks 110, Rockets 98: At Houston, Raymond Felton scored 23 points, Charlie Villanueva added 19 and to lift short-handed Dallas.

Kane extends streak in Chicago win

ST. LOUIS — Patrick Kane kept up his scoring streak and helped the Chicago Blackhawks get a big road win.

Kane scored the tiebreaking goal late in the second period to extend his points streak to 12 games and lead the Blackhawks to a 4-2 victory over the St. Louis Blues on Saturday night.

"That was a really big win," said Blackhawks goalie Corey Crawford, who stopped 29 shots. "That's a tough team to play against. Even when you're playing at home, they are tough to play against. In this building it's even harder to play against them."

"I think we needed this sort of game to get back into the swing of things. It's kind of been up and down and this one was a good test for us."

Andrew Shaw, Trevor van Riemsdyk and Artem Anisimov also scored for Chicago. The Blackhawks, who had lost three of their last four and five of seven, snapped a five-game road losing streak.

"We needed a win on the road," Chicago coach Joel Quenneville said. "We know that we want to be known as a team that plays the same way everywhere we play. We didn't want to change how we play. We saw some other lines score for the first

time all year, so I think that was the most positive thing we've seen and I think it can help us with the balance in our team."

Kane's 12th goal of the season gave him nine goals and 11 assists during his streak — the longest in the league this season. He has 26 points in 17 games.

Avalanche 6, Canadiens 1: Nathan MacKinnon scored twice 13 seconds apart in Colorado's three-goal first period and the Avalanche jumped on a shaky Mike Condon to beat visiting Montreal.

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Reynolds' 4 TDs lead Navy

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Keenan Reynolds had just burst into the end zone to set the NCAA record for career rushing touchdowns, and the last thing on his mind was clutching the football as a keepsake.

Fortunately, Navy coach Ken Niumatalolo had the situation well in hand. He sent the team's equipment manager onto the field to secure a souvenir Reynolds will cherish for years to come.

The senior quarterback scored four rushing touchdowns to boost his career total to 81, and No. 22 Navy beat SMU 55-14 Saturday to remain undefeated in the American Athletic Conference.

Reynolds shattered the mark held by Montee Ball, who ran for 77 TDs with Wisconsin from 2009-12. Ball holds the record for total touchdowns with 83.

The record-breaker for Reynolds came on a 4-yard run on Navy's opening drive. Before being embraced by his teammates, the senior quarterback dropped to one knee, lowered his head and pointed skyward.

Niumatalolo then went into action. "I had a plan to make sure we did not

lose that ball," the coach said. "I just wanted to make sure we got the ball to Keenan and his family. It was great for that to happen. I thought it was great he was able to present the ball to his dad. It's a pretty cool deal."

Reynolds scored on runs of 43 and 8 yards on the next two series to make it 21-0, and then added a 32-yard touchdown with 14:19 left to make it 41-14.

Reynolds rushed for 137 yards and threw a 72-yard touchdown pass to help Navy (8-1, 6-0) earn its fourth straight win. Playing as a ranked team for the first time since 2004, the Midshipmen — 20th in the CFP ranking — are off to their best start since 1963.

SMU knew Reynolds was going to run. The Mustangs were powerless to stop him.

"As an option quarterback, that's the key to it, making good decisions and not turning the ball over," SMU coach Chad Morris said. "He's every bit as good as advertised. Obviously had a great performance tonight."

SMU quarterback Matt Davis ran for a touchdown and threw for a score, but the junior never had a chance of keeping pace

with Navy's prolific attack.

With Reynolds at the controls, the Midshipmen scored on their first four drives, rolled up 403 yards rushing and had a season high in points.

Air Force 35, Utah State 28: Karson Roberts ran for the go-ahead touchdown and threw a career-long 74-yard touchdown pass to Jalen Robinette as Air Force hung on to beat Utah State for their school record 12th straight home win.

Air Force overcame a career-high four touchdown passes by Utah State's Kent Myers in completing its second straight 6-0 season.

Robinette finished with seven receptions for 210 yards, the third highest single-game receiving total in Air Force history.

Tulane 34, Army 31: Tanner Lee threw for 252 yards and two touchdowns and Andrew DiRocco hit the game-winning 35-yard field goal with 4 seconds left as Tulane held off host Army.

Ahmad Bradshaw threw for 121 yards and a pair of touchdowns and added 72 on the ground for the Black Knights (2-8), who lost by less than a touchdown for the sixth time.

Kentucky, Duke win, now await showdown

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Skai Labissiere scored 26 points and fellow freshman Isaiah Briscoe had a double-double as No. 2 Kentucky ran away from NJIT 87-57 on Saturday night.

Seeking a strong tuneup with Tuesday night's showdown looming against defending national champion and fifth-ranked Duke, the Wildcats (2-0) succeeded behind a dominant effort by the 6-foot-11 Labissiere, who was 10-for-12 from the field and made all six free throws to nearly triple his scoring from the previous night against Albany.

After missing the opener with a bruised knee, Briscoe debuted with a team-high 12 rebounds along with 11 points. Derek Willis added 11 points and Marcus Lee had 10 as Kentucky won the first meeting between the schools.

NJIT (0-1) led twice early before being overwhelmed by the taller Wildcats, who dominated the boards 54-23 and held the Highlanders to 31 percent shooting.

Damon Lynn scored 19 points, Ky Howard added 13 and Tim Coleman had 10 for the Highlanders.

No. 5 Duke 113, Bryant 75: At Durham, N.C., Grayson Allen had a career-high 28 points and Matt Jones scored all of his career-best 19 in the first half for the Blue Devils in the 2K Classic.

Freshman Brandon Ingram had 21 points to help the Blue Devils (2-0) earn their second lopsided win in as many nights.

Amile Jefferson had 11 points and 11 rebounds in his second straight double-double, and freshman Luke Kennard added 11 points for the reigning national champions. They never trailed, shot 53 percent, hit 13 three-pointers, forced 19 turnovers and turned them into 24 points.

Hunter Ware scored a career-high 24 points to lead Bryant (0-1).

No. 24 Butler 144, The Citadel 71: At Indianapolis, Kellen Dunham scored 24 points and Butler broke four school records.

The 144 points shattered the previous record of 115 in a regulation win over DePauw in 1965. Trey Pettus' three-pointer gave the Bulldogs a record 129 points for any game with under 6 minutes to play in the second half.

Dunham scored 22 of his 24 points before halftime when the Bulldogs broke two other school records in taking a 71-41 lead.

Butler (1-0) outscored The Citadel 46-12 in the paint.

Roosevelt Jones had 18 points and 11 rebounds for Butler, his eighth career double-double.

Derrick Henry and Quayson Williams both had 13 points for The Citadel (0-1).
