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Verdict in Marine's murder trial likely to spark protests

Protests are likely in the Philippines no matter what verdict is issued Tuesday in the trial of a U.S. Marine accused of killing a transgender woman whom he picked up in a bar and took to a hotel for sex.

The case — which has been heard sporadically since March in a courtroom in Olongapo City, about an 80-mile drive from Manila — has cast a pall over the renewal of military relations between the U.S. and the Philippines, providing fodder for those who object to any American presence.

Pfc. Joseph Scott Pemberton is charged with killing Jeffrey "Jennifer" Laude, 26, on Oct. 11, 2014. The two met in a disco in a red-light district of Olongapo — the main city along Subic Bay — while Pemberton was barhopping with other Marines after joint U.S.-Philippine military exercises. They checked into a nearby hotel, and Laude was later found strangled with her head in the toilet.

"When the Pemberton verdict is announced, there will be protests regardless of the outcome," said Carl Baker of the Pacific Forum think tank in Hawaii.

"When people are reminded of the crime, there is a bump in anti-American sentiment." they are heard. The Philippines will want custody — TV news has reported a cell has been prepared — while the U.S. will almost certainly seek to avoid handing him over until the judicial process is completed.

After Marine Lance Cpl. Daniel Smith was convicted of rape in 2005 and was sentenced to 40 years, many Filipinos were angry when he was detained at the U.S. Embassy rather than a local prison and then returned to the U.S. following a settlement with the victim's family.

But public support also has been growing for a stronger U.S. military presence, particularly with China's aggression in the South China Sea, the ongoing threat of terrorism and the typhoons, earthquakes and volcanoes that regularly batter the country.

U.S. bases in the Philippines were shut down more than two decades ago after the Philippine Senate rejected a treaty to renew their lease.

Then came the rise of Muslim separatist groups like the al-Qaida-linked Abu Sayyaf, which carried out illegal activities, including a lengthy mass kidnapping in 2001 in which they used the ransom to buy better weapons and boats.

The U.S. sent in counterterrorism trainers, high-tech surveillance equipment and other gear to help raise the Philippine military's professionalism in what was dubbed the second front in the global war on terrorism after Afghanistan. Despite criticism of the return of American troops, that lowkey mission — U.S. forces were banned from direct involvement in combat — has been largely hailed as a success, with Abu Sayyaf's leadership decimated.

The U.S. military's image has been further burnished by its help in the wake of natural disasters, particularly the most powerful typhoon on record, which devastated large swaths of the central Philippines two years ago.

Then China began building up disputed, low-lying reefs and islets in the South China Sea that are claimed by the Philippines and other countries. There have been small-scale clashes, leading Manila to sign an agreement with President Barack Obama to allow U.S. forces to pre-position disaster relief supplies and other materials in the country.

That deal spawned its own backlash, with the Philippine Senate calling it a treaty that should require Senate ratification instead of something that the president could finalize alone. The national Supreme Court is considering the constitutionality of the agreement now, with a decision expected in December that could spark its own protests.

Patricio Abinales, a Philippines expert at the University of Hawaii, said any fallout from the Pemberton case is likely to be short-lived.

"I think there will be the usual noise from the small, left-wing groups, but in the light of what China is doing, and with Obama reiterating American commitment to Philippine security during last week's APEC meeting, Pemberton's case will be in the media for at most a week, then disappear to the inside pages," Abinales said.

Agency to release report on NC base water

HIGH POINT, N.C. — A federal agency will issue a report this week about the effects on people from past water contamination at Camp Lejeune, N.C., a study that included meetings earlier this year in the Piedmont Triad area.

The Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry will release the results of the investigation Saturday. The health studies were conducted to understand the impact of exposure to contaminated drinking water at Camp Lejeune.

The studies included hearings held in Greensboro in May during which federal investigators heard from Marines and sailors, their families and civilian staff who might have been at the base during the time when drinking water was tainted.

The contamination of drinking water at Camp Lejeune started in the early 1950s and ended in 1985, when contaminated water wells were removed from use. Contaminants in the water included tetrachloroethylene, trichloroethylene, benzene and vinyl chloride.

A privately owned dry cleaner next to Camp Lejeune, as well as base activities that released fuel and chlorinated solvents into the environment, were identified as the sources of the contamination, according to the federal government. Studies have linked exposures to the drinking water with a number of diseases and health conditions, including multiple cancers and preterm births. Marine Corps and Navy personnel, their families and civilian employees who worked at the base were part of the studies.

There have been periods in recent years when a single incident has sparked weeks of protests in front of the U.S. Embassy.

If Pemberton is acquitted, there will be accusations that the trial was fixed. If he's convicted, appeals are certain, and there likely will be wrangling over where he will be held while

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Downing of plane concerns US' Arab allies

AMMAN, Jordan — Turkey's downing of a Russian jet along the Syrian-Turkish border has alarmed America's Arab allies, who fear another such incident could lead to a "very hot response" by Moscow that could sabotage the fight against the Islamic State group.

"The situation along the border (between Syria and Turkey) is critical now," said Hisham Jabar, a former Lebanese general who is now a military analyst.

The Jordanians had been reaching out to Russia in hopes of encouraging Moscow to zero in on Islamic State fighters in Syria rather than Arab and Western-backed insurgents.

Jordan, which allows U.S. jets

to operate from its soil, has set up a joint coordination center with Russia in the capital of Amman to share information on military actions in Syria. Such efforts have been complicated by the fallout from the Turkish attack on the Russian jet. Two Russians — the plane's pilot and a member of the rescue team — were killed in the incident.

Turkish authorities claim the jet flew across a tip of Turkish territory jutting south into northwestern Syria, something Russia denies. They said the F-16 flight leader warned the Russian crew 10 times to turn away before engaging.

"We anticipate a tense Syrian border with Turkey," said a senior Jordanian official familiar with discussions on Tuesday — the day of the attack — between Jordan's King Abdullah and Russian President Vladimir Putin in the Russian resort of Sochi. "The Russians will not let this one go unanswered."

He said he was certain Turkey, a NATO member, would face a "very hot response" if another Russian plane was threatened. He spoke on condition of anonymity.

Jordan, which hosts more than 1 million refugees from the nearly five-year war in neighboring Syria, is one of the few Arab countries still bombing Islamic State targets in that country. The air force has been regularly pounding the militants since February, when they burned alive a captured Jordanian pilot. In the third week of November, it carried out 70 strikes, the military said.

But Jordan, a traditional U.S. ally in the Middle East and one

of the few regional countries that has escaped turmoil in recent years, also has been forging stronger ties with Moscow since the start of the Syrian civil war. King Abdullah, whose country is squeezed between hot spots Iraq, Syria, Israel and the Palestinian territories, has said that any political solution to the conflict in Syria required a "strong role" by Russia.

Analysts in the region have expressed concern that growing tensions between Turkey and Russia could undermine a U.S.-led attempt to open a peace process in January by bringing Syria's government and rebel groups to the negotiating table for the first time, while excluding the Islamic State group and other extremists.

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Many said dead after Russian strike in Syria

BEIRUT — Airstrikes believed to have been carried out by Russian warplanes killed at least 18 people and wounded dozens more on Sunday in a northern Syrian town held by insurgents, Syrian opposition media reported.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said the airstrikes struck the town of Ariha, killing at least 18 people and wounding dozens more. The Local Coordination Committees, an activist collective, said the airstrikes struck a busy market, inflicting heavy casualties.

The Observatory, which relies on a network of activists inside Syria, said the airstrike destroyed three buildings in the center of Ariha. Ariha Today, a Facebook page that covers events in the town, said the airstrikes were carried out by Russian warplanes, killing 40 people and wounding more than 70. Conflicting tolls are common in the chaotic aftermath of violent incidents in Syria.

If Russian warplanes carried out Sunday's strikes, it would be one of the deadliest incidents since Moscow began launching airstrikes in Syria two months ago. Opposition activists say scores of people have been killed by Russian strikes since the air campaign began on Sept. 30.

Congress struggles to avoid another shutdown

WASHINGTON — Congress is racing to close out a \$1.1 trillion spending bill by Dec. 11 and avoid a holiday season governthese so-called riders are often the last, best chance to push items on their agenda through Congress.

Republicans have attached provisions that take on President Barack Obama's health overhaul, new environmental regulations and the 2010 Dodd-Frank law tightening oversight of the financial services industry. If history is any guide, Obama and Democrats, whose votes will be needed to pass the spending bill, will avoid most of them.

But lots of lower-tier issues are in play. For example, anti-Castro forces in the House appear unlikely to reverse Obama's moves to loosen rules about traveling to Cuba. And supporters of medical marijuana are hopeful they can win guarantees against harassment by federal authorities.

Official: Suspect said 'no more baby parts'

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Robert Lewis Dear was reclusive, and he seldom spoke to neighbors in a quiet patch of woods in rural Colorado where he lived.

Now, it's his words that are drawing the most attention as police try to discern his motivations for a shooting attack they say he carried out Friday at a Planned Parenthood clinic in Colorado Springs that killed three people, including a police officer.

After his arrest, Dear said "no more baby parts," said a law enforcement official, who could not elaborate and spoke on condition of anonymity because the official was not authorized to speak publicly about the ongoing investigation.

Planned Parenthood cited witnesses as saying the gunman was motivated by his opposition to abortion. The Planned Parenthood facility in Colorado Springs provides women's health services and has long been the site of regular anti-abortion protests.

The College Football Playoff selection committee is set up to have a pretty easy championship weekend.

Clemson is in with a win.

Alabama is in with a win.

The winner of the Big Ten championship game between Iowa and Michigan State gets in.

And Oklahoma pretty much sealed up its spot on Saturday night with a 58-23 win at Oklahoma State in its finale.

Barring surprises in the Atlantic Coast Conference championship game or the Southeastern Conference title game next Saturday, Jeff Long's crew should be able to get a decent night's sleep before revealing the field.

The committee might want to send Stanford a thank you note. Unfortunately for the Cardinal, it probably won't come with an invitation to the final four.

The Cardinal beat Notre Dame 38-36 on a last-second field goal, handing the Fighting Irish (10-2, No. 6 CFP) their second loss of the season. Notre Dame at 11-1 probably would have forced the committee to at least reconsider whether the Fighting Irish belonged in over maybe the Big 12 champion Sooners or the Big Ten champion.

Not a problem anymore.

Stanford heads to the Pac-12 championship game against USC, hoping for an upset in the ACC or SEC.

Clemson has to get through North Carolina, which has won 11 straight since an opening loss to South Carolina. The Tar Heels (11-1, No. 14 CFP) haven't gotten much love from the committee without marquee victories on their resume and two FCS wins. Beating Clemson (12-0, No. 1 CFP) would be about as big as it gets, but North Carolina has a long way to jump.

Maybe Florida can throw the committee a curve? The Gators (10-2, No. 12 CFP) trudge into the SEC championship game against Alabama (11-1, No. 2 CFP), coming off a 27-2 loss to Florida State. A Florida victory next week would likely leave the SEC out of the playoff. More likely though, the SEC championship will be an opportunity for Crimson Tide tailback Derrick Henry to wrap up the Heisman after he went for 271 yards on a school-record 46 carries in a victory against Auburn on Saturday.

Who else is hoping for chaos? Hello, Ohio State (11-1, No. 8 CFP).

The Buckeyes were a week too late with their best performance of the season, pounding Michigan 42-13 behind Ezekiel Elliott, who got plenty of touches and ran all over the Wolverines.

Ohio State might have to settle for the Rose Bowl as a pretty cool consolation prize.

Who's No. 1: Rivalry games can be tricky and both Clemson and Alabama had difficultly pulling away in their annual in-state grudge matches.

The Tigers again gave the selection committee some reason to reconsider whether they should be No. 1. Deshaun Watson was great, running for three touchdowns and passing for another, but the Clemson defense had a tough time containing South Carolina in a 37-32 victory.

"I'm just looking to be 13-0 next week," said Watson, who bolstered his Heisman Trophy credentials.

Clemson takes a 15-game winning streak into the Atlantic Coast Conference championship game.

A more dominant performance by Alabama, which beat Auburn 29-13, might have given the committee reason to flip the Tide and Tigers. While Alabama's overall resume features more wins against good teams, Clemson gets the edge in big victories with wins against Notre Dame and Florida State.

Body of work probably still goes to the Tigers.

What's on the line is home-field advantage of sorts.

The No. 1 seed gets to play as close to home as possible. That would put Clemson in the Orange Bowl in Miami if it's still the top team. The Cotton Bowl in North Texas will host the other semifinal. Ideally, the committee would not want put a team seeded third or fourth too close to home, but if the rankings stay as is with Oklahoma at No. 3, the Sooners would get a short trip to the Dallas area to play the Tide.

OAKLAND, Calif. — Stephen Curry scored 19 points in Golden State's NBArecord 18th straight win at the start of a season, but what he didn't do against the Sacramento Kings was just as important to the defending champion Warriors.

Curry, the league's reigning Most Valuable Player and its leading scorer this season with an average of 32.6 points, played less than 30 minutes in the 120-101 victory Saturday night and took only seven shots — all but one in the first quarter.

"I'm sure Steph doesn't like it," Warriors interim head coach Luke Walton said. "But the coaching staff and the training staff, we're thrilled to get him that rest."

Draymond Green had his second straight triple-double and the Warriors, who led by 10 points at halftime, opened the third quarter with a 27-8 run that included four three-pointers by Brandon Rush to build their lead to 29 points. The Kings didn't get within 21 points again until the final minute of the game.

Green had 13 points, 11 rebounds and 12 assists. Rush scored 16 points and Klay Thompson added 15 for the Warriors. Rudy Gay scored 20 points for Sacramento, which fell to 6-12.

Fury halts Klitschko's title reign

DUESSELDORF, Germany — Tyson Fury defeated Wladimir Klitschko by unanimous decision Saturday to end the Ukrainian's 9½-year reign as heavyweight champion and fulfill his father's prophesy from the day he was born.

Born three months early and weighing just one pound, Fury wasn't given much chance to live, but John Fury told doctors it was his destiny to live and become heavyweight champion of the world. He named the second of his six sons Tyson, after Mike Tyson.

Twenty-seven years later, the 6-foot-9 Tyson Fury, who comes from a bloodline of bare-knuckle champions on both sides of his family, finally lived up to his name. "It's something I've been working on for

"It's something I've been working on for my whole life," Fury said. "I'm bred to be a fighter."

After a bruising encounter that ended with cuts near both of Klitschko's eyes, referee Tony Weeks went to the judges' scorecards.

Cesar Ramos and Raul Caiz Sr. scored it 115-112 each, while Ramon Cerdan had it 116-111 in favor of the undefeated Briton (25-0, 18 KO).

Fury took Klitschko's WBA, IBF, and WBO heavyweight belts, as well as the minor IBO title, and attention turned immediately to a potential rematch.

"We have a rematch clause in the contract," Klitschko promoter Bernd Boente said.

Klitschko (64-4, 53 KO), contesting his 28th title fight, was cautious until attempting a recovery in the final rounds, but suffered his first defeat since April 2004.

"The speed was missing. Reach played a big role. I tried but it didn't work," said Klitschko, who at 6-foot-6, was in the unusual position of facing someone taller. Fury, who weighed in at 247 pounds also had 1.1 pound weight advantage.

Klitschko, the premier heavyweight of his era, relinquished the IBF belt he had held since 2006, the WBO title he'd owned since 2008, and the WBA crown he'd had since 2011.
