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## **Congress looks to address bonus paybacks**

WASHINGTON — Congress is set to take key steps over the coming week to address the public scandal over efforts by the California National Guard to recoup wartime re-enlistment bonuses from thousands of soldiers.

House and Senate lawmakers could approve an annual defense policy bill that requires a review of all cases of recoupment in the state between 2004 and 2015 and give a waiver unless it can prove soldiers "knew or reasonably should have known" they were ineligible for the benefit.

Meanwhile, the House Armed Services Committee is calling top National Guard officers and Pentagon officials to testify Dec. 7 on the recoupment of bonus and education benefits.

The California National Guard sparked public outrage in October for pursuing repayment of bonuses worth \$15,000 or more from about 9,700 soldiers who had re-enlisted during the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan as part of the service's effort to boost troop numbers.

California lawmakers had pressed for some financial relief for troops to be added to the National Defense Authorization Act, a sprawling piece of legislation that sets defense policy for the coming year.

A group of more than 100 House members — mostly Democrats — also sent a letter to the chamber's leadership asking they move quickly to pass a law giving troops some relief from repaying the money.

The proposed NDAA bill unveiled by lawmakers this week states the Guard should review all California recoupment cases by July and "shall evaluate the evidence in a light most favorable" to soldiers who have repaid bonuses or are facing repayment, according to a copy of the bill obtained by Stars and Stripes.

The bill must still pass Congress, and a vote in the House is expected this week followed by a final vote in the Senate next week. Before becoming law, it must also be signed by President Barack Obama.

A waiver should be granted "unless the board makes an affirmative determination, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the member knew or reasonably should have known that the member was ineligible for the bonus pay, special pay, student loan repayment, or other special payment otherwise subject to recoupment," according to the bill.

The change could remove some of the

burden from soldiers fighting recoupment efforts.

The Defense Department would have to help wipe clean any bad credit ratings related to waived cases by contacting credit reporting agencies and telling them the debt was invalid.

The bill also calls for new militarywide protections for soldiers and retirees in such cases. The DOD would not be allowed to garnish wages or retirement pay of servicemembers who unknowingly received any overpayments unless the recollection effort is done within 10 years.

Audits of recoupment cases and reports to Congress would be required annually during the next decade.

Congress could have a full report on the California bonus repayments by August if the NDAA passes.

However, the House Armed Services Committee will look more closely at the issue next week. Lt. Gen. Timothy Kadavy, director of the Army National Guard, and Maj. Gen. David Baldwin, adjutant general of the California National Guard, are set to testify to the committee about the bonuses, along with Peter Levine, who is performing the duties of the undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness.

## Biggest military pay raise in 5 years is in NDAA bill

WASHINGTON — Troops would get their biggest pay raise in years under the final version of Congress' annual defense policy bill unveiled Tuesday.

policy bill also includes \$3.2 billion to boost troop numbers and bolster Marine Corps and Air Force aviation, a military health care overhaul and a requirement to study whether women should be included in the military draft.

The NDAA was hashed out during months of negotiations between the House and Senate, which had disagreed about an \$18 billion spending increase for the military. The proposal was pared down in the final bill but the \$3.2 billion increase could run into opposition from Democrats, who have demanded any additional defense spending be matched with dollars for domestic programs.

Military pay raises have been kept below 2 percent since 2011.

The language in the NDAA overrides President Barack Obama's order to set pay raises at 1.6 percent in 2017, which was a slight increase over the The House aides said the additional \$3.2 billion will also help fill gaps in military readiness — especially for the Air Force and Marine Corps, which have maintenance and training problems with F-18 fighter jets and CH-53 helicopters.

Tricare, the military's health

The 2.1 percent increase included in the National Defense Authorization Act would break a five-year trend of raises that have fallen below the private sector. The higher pay would go into effect Jan. 1 if the bill is passed by Congress, and it could receive an initial vote in the House on Friday.

The bill also freezes a drawdown in the Army, keeping its end strength at 476,000, and boosts Reserve forces by 4,000. The House and Senate conference committee rejected a proposal to require women between 18 and 25 years old to register with the Selective Service.

### Carter calls on Congress to rethink DOD funding

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense Ash Carter on Tuesday urged Congress to reconsider what he called an "unacceptable" plan to extend the Pentagon's current funding levels through May, arguing that decision would add risk to ongoing military operations overseas.

It is "unprecedented and unacceptable, especially when we have so many troops operating in harm's way," Carter wrote Tuesday in a letter addressed to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and House Speaker Paul Ryan.

Congress funds all federal agencies on a yearly basis from Oct. 1 of one year to Sept. 30 of the next year. However, in the last several years, the House and Senate have failed to reach an agreement on defense spending before Sept. 30.

Instead, lawmakers have passed short-term resolutions to keep funds set at the previous year's levels for a few months, usually through December, while they worked out a budget agreement.

Last spring, Carter proposed a \$582.7 billion defense budget that included a request for an additional \$3.4 billion to increase U.S. forces in Europe and more than \$7 billion for counterterrorism operations.

It also included \$1.8 billion to purchase 45,000 GPS-guided smart bombs to replenish stocks run down by the air campaigns in Iraq and Syria.

## **Coalition faces carrier shortage**

ABOARD THE CHARLES DE GAULLE — France will continue to support the fight against the Islamic State group even after its only aircraft carrier, the Charles de Gaulle, heads home in December to conduct a maintenance period expected to last more than a year.

The loss of the Charles de Gaulle leaves the U.S.-led coalition to defeat the Islamic State without one of its most powerful and potent weapons after a vital turning point in the campaign.

French President Francois Hollande had twice extended the nuclear-powered warship's latest deployment, pushing its depot period back until after the vessel's return home in mid-December.

"France wanted to intensify its efforts within the coalition in this period, which is a turning point of the fight," said Rear Adm. Olivier Lebas, commander of Task Force 473.

"Everywhere Daesh is losing territory ... and it's a turning point also because we started the fight in Mosul," he said, using an alternative name for the Islamic State group. "Daesh is enduring tremendous pressure. It's very important to maintain this high pressure to take advantage of this positive momentum in the theater."

The 42,000-ton carrier, known in the navy by its nickname "Le Grand Charles," has played a crucial role in Operation Chammal, the French anti-Islamic State campaign in the Middle East.

The 24 multirole Rafale M fighter-bombers onboard tripled the number of jets France is using to conduct strikes and reconnaissance missions over Iraq and Syria as part of the operation. The ship's ability to maneuver closer to the conflict and choose from where it conducts strikes adds a flexibility the ground-based aircraft don't have. Over the past two years it's operated from the eastern Mediterranean and the Persian Gulf.

"Precision strikes from the French aircraft carrier Charles de Gaulle have decimated Daesh, enabling Iraqi security forces to close in on and begin the liberation of Mosul," the public affairs office for the U.S.led coalition said in a recent statement.

Since September 2015, French air forces — both the air force and naval aviation — have conducted more than 5,200 missions and 1,000 strikes, destroying 1,600 targets, French officials say. They've conducted 100 strikes since the beginning of the Mosul battle.

The timing of the carrier's departure comes as Iraqi and Kurdish coalition partners on the ground continue pushing deeper into Mosul. In Syria, government forces and their Russian allies are advancing into rebel areas of Aleppo, while Kurdish-led rebel groups are working on isolating Raqqa, the Islamic State's de facto capital.

The French are not the only ones facing a shortage of carriers.

The USS Dwight D. Eisenhower is also scheduled to finish its deployment in the near future. Barring any extension or scheduling changes, the coalition may not have the assistance of a carrier until early next year, when the USS George H.W. Bush is scheduled to arrive in theater.

That would leave the Admiral Kuznetsov, the flagship of the Russian navy, as the only carrier in the region. The Russians, however, have mainly focused on fighting rebel groups trying to overthrow the regime of Syrian President Bashar Assad rather than confronting the Islamic State.

Refueling and important maintenance for the Charles de Gaulle, which occurs every 10 years, cannot be postponed any longer, said Lebas. "It's like your car," he said. "When you have no fuel left in your tank, you have to stop to refuel. Even if you want to continue, you have to stop." France plans to maintain its pressure on the Islamic State and will find other ways of assisting the coalition with other assets, depending on what the coalition needs, Lebas said. He couldn't speak to specifics about what the French could do.

The French currently have 12 Air Force Rafale assisting the campaign. They also deployed artillery forces on the ground near Mosul in September.

Lebas said there are two key focuses to keep French naval pilots up to date while the Charles De Gaulle is sidelined. The pilots must maintain their operational capability and theater knowledge by deploying and flying in conflict areas, and they must maintain their ability to fly from carriers at sea.

The French navy is looking at a number of possibilities to maintain those capabilities, though no decisions have been made yet.

The major terrorist attacks around France in 2015 are still fresh in the minds of the crew, some of whom are completing their third deployment in less than two years.

Since gunmen opened fire in the Charlie Hebdo magazine headquarters in January 2015, 200 people have been killed in terrorist attacks throughout France, including 130 in a massive coordinated attack in Paris in November 2015.

"The attacks in Paris are a very big part of the crew's determination, the crew's will, the crew's resilience," said Charles De Gaulle commanding officer Capt. Eric Malbrunot. "Everybody knows why we have the deployments, why we have been extended ... It's very clear in everyone's minds why we are here."

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## 'The flames were right in my backyard'

### Rain hits fire-ravaged Smoky Mountains towns as death toll climbs to 4

GATLINBURG, Tenn. — Thunderstorms dumped much-needed rain on eastern Tennessee overnight as thousands of people waited anxiously for news about their homes after wildfires tore through

this resort community, killing

at least four people. Officials confirmed a new fatality Wednesday, saying the victim was found at a motel. A mandatory evacuation order remained in place for Gatlinburg as firefighters monitored a few remaining hot spots in the area near the Great Smoky Mountains.

There were severe thunderstorm warnings for the area, ahead of a line of storms moving across the Southeast. Those storms had already spawned possible tornadoes in parts of Alabama and Tennessee, killing five people and injuring more than a dozen. Officials in the Gatlinburg area were worried about mudslides, rock slides and high winds knocking trees onto power lines, perhaps creating new fires.

Tod Hyslop, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service, said the region had received about an inch of rain and the forecast calls for thunderstorms to pick up in the afternoon and taper off by early evening.

"The rain is going to help with the suppression of some of the active fires. The rain may help prevent some of the further brush fires. But I also want to say that unless that rain penetrates deep enough into that duff, into that leaf clutter, then those hot spots can still arise," Gatlinburg Fire Chief Greg Miller said.

At the Rocky Top Sports World complex on the outskirts of town, Wolf McLellan, 30, stumbled into the Red Cross shelter after a day of wandering the streets. He was forced to evacuate the hotel where he was staying. He grabbed his guitar, two computers and his Social Security card and tried to flee with his dog, Kylie.

"She was too scared to move with the smoke and sirens and she just stood there. I didn't want to drag her. I couldn't drag her," he said. "I figured the humane thing to do would be to just cut her loose."

Tracy Mayberry lives in a house next door to the motel. He said a tree fell on his house and when he went outside to investigate "the flames were right in my backyard." He put his wife and 12-year-old into the car and left. He doesn't know if his house is still standing.

"Everything we own is in the house. I mean, we got the clothes on my back and maybe one more outfit," he said. "It's been devastating, I'll say that. It's been crazy. All you can do is keep breathing, keep your head up and keep going."

The fire picked its spots as it tore through the Gatlinburg area: It destroyed at least 150 buildings but left others intact.

By Tuesday evening, almost nothing remained of the Castle, perhaps the largest and most iconic home overlooking Gatlinburg. Entire churches disappeared. So did the Cupid's Chapel of Love wedding venue, though its managers promised to move scheduled weddings to a sister venue, Chapel at the Park.

Officials surveying early damage said the Westgate Smoky Mountain Resort & Spa, with more than 100 buildings, is likely entirely gone.

Fanned by hurricane-force winds Monday night, the flames reached the doorstep of Dollywood, the theme park in nearby Pigeon Forge named after country music legend and local hero Dolly Parton. The park was spared any significant damage and will reopen Friday.

Much remained uncertain for a region that serves as the gateway into the Great Smoky Mountains, the country's most visited national park. Searchand-rescue efforts continued in areas that have been unreachable because of downed power lines and trees.

A somber reality set in for Gatlinburg, a city of about 4,000 residents that draws more than 11 million visitors a year. But even Gatlinburg Mayor Mike Werner, who lost his home in the fire, remained steadfast that his city will recover.

"We're more concerned about everybody else. We're concerned about a lot of the families that may not have been insured," he said.

"A lot of the families that don't know where to go or what's next. We want to give that positive message that everything, absolutely, is going to be OK."

### Police officer who killed suspect in NC won't be charged

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — A Charlotte police officer who shot and killed a black man at an apartment complex, touching off several nights of unrest in the city, will not face charges, a North Carolina prosecutor ansurveillance video showing the outline of what appeared to be a holstered gun on Scott's ankle, and he gave extensive details about other evidence that Scott was armed.

Plainclothes officers had gone to the complex about 4 p.m. on Sept. 20 looking for a suspect with an outstanding warrant when they saw Scott — not the suspect they were looking for — inside a car with a gun and marijuana, department spokesman Keith Trietley has said in a statement. Officers saw Scott get out of the car with a gun and then get back in, police said. When officers approached, they said, Scott exited the car with the gun again. At that point, officers deemed Scott a threat and Vinson fired his weapon.

Scott, 43, was pronounced dead at Carolinas Medical Center. An autopsy report from Mecklenburg County authorities says Scott died of gunshot wounds to the back and abdomen. Vinson, who is also black, had been with the department for two years at the time of the shooting. He has been on administrative leave, which is standard in police shootings. Scott's family has said he did not have a gun, but detectives recovered a firearm at the scene, police said.

Body camera and dashcam recordings released earlier by the police department did not conclusively show that and city officials were criticized for the length of time it took to release police video of the shooting. Scott's final moments also were recorded by his wife, Rakeyia, in a video shared widely on social media. She can be heard shouting to police that her husband "doesn't have a gun." She pleads with the officers not to shoot before a burst of gunfire can be heard.

## **Castro's ashes on journey to Santiago**

HAVANA — Fidel Castro's ashes began a four-day journey across Cuba on Wednesday from Havana to their final resting place in the eastern city of Santiago.

A small, Cuban-flag covered cedar coffin containing the remains of the 90-yearold leader was taken out of Cuba's Defense Ministry just after 7 a.m. and placed into a flower-bedecked trailer pulled by a green military vehicle for the more than 500mile procession. The ashes will be interred Sunday, ending the nine-day mourning period for the man who ruled the country for nearly 50 years.

The route traces in reverse the victory tour Castro and his bearded rebels took after overthrowing the forces of strongman Fulgencio Batista in 1959.

Carpenter Rene Mena, 58, said his mother had taken him out of his Havana home as a baby to see Castro arrive.

"It's an irreparable loss," said Mena, who was waiting on the Malecon coastal boulevard holding a Cuban flag. "He fought for us, prepared us, educated us."

Outside Havana, the caravan will pass through rural communities significantly changed by social and economic reforms he adopted. Many residents now have access to health care and education. But many of those towns are also in a prolonged economic collapse, the country's once-dominant sugar industry decimated, the sugar mills and plantations gone.

Thousands of Cubans lined the streets of Havana, some sleeping on sidewalks over-

night, to bid goodbye to Castro. Many had attended a massive rally Tuesday night at Havana's Revolution Plaza, where the presidents of Cuba, Mexico, Ecuador, Bolivia, Venezuela and South Africa, along with leaders of a host of smaller nations, offered speeches paying tribute to Castro, who died Friday night.

The crowds at the rally and along Wednesday's procession route were a mix of people attending on their own and groups of Cubans organized by government workplaces, where attendance was not strictly obligatory but with strong pressure to attend. Some groups of government workers slept on the streets because all public transport had been commandeered to move people to Castro-related activities.

## Trump vows to leave empire, focus on US

WASHINGTON — President-elect Donald Trump said Wednesday he's leaving his business empire to focus on being the nation's 45th president, declaring he can successfully avoid conflicts of interest between governing and profiting in the private sector.

"I will be leaving my great business in total in order to fully focus on running the country in order to make America great again," he tweeted in a series of missives sent before dawn. "While I am not mandated to do this under the law, I feel it is visually important, as president, to in no way have a conflict of interest with my various businesses."

Trump did not provide any details about how he planned to separate from his businesses, though he said legal documents were being prepared. He has previously said that he'd leave his business operations to his three eldest children — Donald Jr., Eric and Ivanka. Trump senior adviser Kellyanne Conway said Wednesday the three are expected to "increase their responsibilities" in the Trump Organization. Ethics experts have pushed

for Trump to fully exit the ownership of his businesses using a blind trust or equivalent arrangement.

"Otherwise he will have a personal financial interest in his businesses that will sometimes conflict with the public interest and constantly raise questions," Norman Eisen, President Barack Obama's chief ethics lawyer, and Richard Painter, who held the same post for President George W. Bush, said in a joint statement Wednesday.

Trump was also moving forward with his Cabinet selections, choosing former Goldman Sachs executive Steven Mnuchin as treasury secretary and billionaire investor Wilbur Ross for commerce secretary.

Mnuchin, 53, led Trump's finance operations during the presidential campaign. But he has no government experience, which could prove a political hurdle. If confirmed by the Senate, Mnuchin would play a central role in shaping Trump's tax policies and infrastructure plans. He would also lead an agency tasked with implementing international economic sanctions.

## No clear impeachment path in South Korea

SEOUL, South Korea — South Korean President Park Geun-hye's conditional resignation offer appears to be causing cracks in what previously had been a strong push for her impeachment, with opponents now struggling to set a date for a vote to strip her of power.

Park offered Tuesday to leave office if parliament arranges a safe transfer of power, triggering an immediate backlash from opposition parties, which called the overture a stalling tactic to help the president navigate through a political scandal involving her shadowy confidante.

Leaders of the country's three main opposition parties met Wednesday and agreed to stick with their plan to try to vote on an impeachment motion as early as Friday. But they also said they'd meet again if that plan does not work, meaning they're bracing for the possibility that a Friday vote might not take place. Much of their hesitation to pick a clear date is due to the fact that there are not enough opposition lawmakers to pass an impeachment through parliament, and they would need help from dissenters in Park's Saenuri Party. The three opposition parties and anti-Park independent lawmakers have a total of 172 seats in the 300seat National Assembly. A passage of an impeachment motion requires at least 200 votes in favor. About 40 ruling party lawmakers have expressed their willingness to vote to oust Park.

But after Park's resignation offer Tuesday, made in an address to the nation, anti-Park lawmakers gathered and agreed it would be best for Park to resign in April after the installation of a neutral Cabinet that can help ensure a stable power transfer until a new president is elected, according to the office of Hwang Youngcheul, one of the lawmakers who attended the meeting.

They said they would still take part in a possible impeachment vote on Dec. 9 if details for an April resignation aren't worked out, Hwang's office said. If impeached, Park's presidential powers would be suspended until the Constitutional Court makes a ruling. The court would have 180 days to deliberate.

#### Cops say woman killed threatening husband

**MO** ADVANCE — Authorities in southeast Missouri said a woman killed her husband by running him down with a car after he threatened to kill her and a child.

The Cape Girardeau County Sheriff's Office said in a Facebook post that the 45-year-old Delta man died Saturday after abducting his wife and child. The post said he threatened to kill himself as well as the woman and the youngster.

After driving around with them, he returned to a residence, and the wife was able to escape and get into another vehicle. The post said she ran him down "before he could shoot her."

The name of the man wasn't immediately released. The woman is being treated for injuries sustained during the assault.

### As flight lands, woman jumps onto plane wing

**TX** HOUSTON — Authorities said a woman jumped from an emergency exit door onto the wing of a plane after it landed at a Houston airport, and she took off running toward the terminal before being caught.

Authorities said the woman was a passenger on a United Airlines flight from New Orleans that landed in Houston on Monday afternoon and was near the gate. She opened the emergency door and jumped onto the plane's wing and to the ground at George Bush Intercontinental Airport.

The woman was detained, and police said she was taken to a hospital for a psychiatric face charges.

## **Browns still cling to hope in bye week**

BEREA, Ohio — Amid this season of depression and despair, the Browns haven't lost hope.

And as he and his teammates prepare for a much-needed by week following 12 straight losses, rookie wide receiver Corey Coleman looked to the future and offered a shred of optimism.

"I've been winning my whole life," he said. "But the tables are going to turn. It can't get any worse."

Sadly, there's still another level of miserv for the Browns (0-12), now four losses from joining the 2008 Detroit Lions as the only teams in NFL history to complete a 16-game schedule without a win. They can avoid that notoriety with a victory that has remained elusive so far.

This is new territory for Coleman and Cleveland's 17 other rookies, who in addition to adjusting to life as paid professionals, are getting their first real taste of failure as athletes.

"It's tough around here," Coleman said Monday, a day after the Browns fell 27-13 to the New York Giants, Cleveland's 15th straight loss dating to last season. "But we're going to continue to keep on working. I'm going to continue to keep on working.

Nobody's given up, and that's what's really good about this locker room and the older guys leading us and stuff, nobody's showing any signs of quitting."

Browns coach Hue Jackson won't let them.

Jackson, who became emotional while discussing the agony of his first season in Cleveland following Sunday's game, said he's determined to get win No. 1 before the 2016 season ends. The Browns will take some time off, but Jackson has no plans to decompress.

"I honestly do not know how to," he said. "I need to teach myself how to do it. I know my kids would like for me to do it. I just think what is important is to just keep searching. I owe our fan base and our organization and these players an opportunity to win a game. The next one up is Cincinnati. We are going to do whatever it takes to get ourselves in that 'W' column."

Jackson has spent the season shuffling quarterbacks and another switch could be on the horizon.

Robert Griffin III, out since breaking a bone in his left shoulder in the opener, returned to practice last week and could play in Cleveland's final four games. He was cleared Tuesday for contact.

Jackson acknowledged that Griffin, who has made just one start since the end of the

2014 season, might be able to jump-start the Browns' offense, which has scored just 39 points in the past four games.

"We have to find a way to get the ball in the end zone better than what we have, and if somebody can do that better, then we are going to play him," Jackson said.

The Browns want to get another look at Griffin before heading into an offseason when they'll need to make major personnel decisions, none more important than at quarterback. They have two first-round draft picks, and it's possible they'll use one on their next OB.

That's down the road. Of more immediate concern for Jackson is getting his team to finish this dreadful season on a positive note.

Jackson extracted some positives from Sunday, but he won't be satisfied until the Browns win and that's why he briefly choked up Sunday. He received numerous sympathetic texts, but joked that he deleted them all.

The losing has hurt, but hasn't changed him.

"I am what I am," Jackson said. "What you guys see in me is what you are going to get. I am not a phony and I am human like everybody else, so that is just part of it. You might see more of it than that over the course of time here."

Ohio State held firm at second in the College Football Playoff rankings, putting the Buckeyes in position to become the first team to be selected to the final four without winning its conference.

The second-to-last rankings were released Tuesday night and Alabama was No. 1, followed by Ohio State, Clemson and Washington. The Crimson Tide, Tigers and Huskies all play conference championship games this weekend and presumably would be in good shape to make the playoff if they win. The final rankings and playoff pairings will be released Sunday.

Unbeaten Alabama is probably in good shape to make the playoff even if it loses to Florida in the Southeastern Conference title game Saturday

Michigan dropped to five after losing to Ohio State. Wisconsin was sixth and Penn State was seventh. The Badgers and Nittany Lions will play for the Big Ten title in Indianapolis on Saturday.

#### **Huskies vs. Wolverines**

Assuming the Buckeyes are a lock, and it looks good for them, and Clemson doesn't get upset by Virginia Tech in the ACC title game, the debate for the committee when it gathers in Texas on Saturday night to watch games and discuss the only rankings that matter will be Pac-12 or Big Ten.

Can Michigan, or maybe the Big Ten champion with two losses, edge a Washington team that would finish 12-1 by beating Colorado on Friday night in the Pac-12 title game?

Penn State fans, however, are already cranking up the complaints. The Nittany Lions beat Ohio State in October. Add a Big Ten title and Penn State is bound to feel slighted.

Conference titles and headto-head results are essentially used by the committee like tiebreakers when teams are very close. The Buckeyes and Nittany Lions are not in the committee's eyes. At least not yet.

"The selection committee recognizes the head-to-head win, but in this particular case, it hasn't been the distinguishing point in our evaluation of those two teams," he said.

#### Sugar Bowl

Assuming Alabama is in the playoff, the Southeastern Conference sends its next highest ranked team to the Sugar Bowl to face the Big 12 champion, which will be decided when No. 9 Oklahoma and No. 10 Oklahoma State play in Norman on Saturday.

No. 14 Auburn is that SEC team right now. Florida is 15th, so a good performance — even in a loss — against the Crimson Tide might get the Gators to New Orleans on a two-game losing streak. A Florida loss would leave every SEC team other than Alabama with at least four losses.

But the contract with the Sugar says the SEC gets the spot, mediocre or not.

#### **Orange Bowl**

Louisville beat Florida State by 43 points in September, but the Cardinals have stumbled down the stretch and now the Seminoles are 12th and the Cardinals are 13th. If that order holds — and there is no reason to think it won't because neither is playing — and Clemson goes to the playoff as the ACC champion, then Florida State will represent the conference in the Orange Bowl.

Hocutt said Florida State has played one of the toughest schedules in the country while Louisville has beaten only one team with a winning record (Florida State). He said the Seminoles are playing better lately.

The highest-ranked conference champion from outside the Power Five is getting a Cotton Bowl bid and at this point it looks as if it will be No. 17 Western Michigan if the unbeaten Broncos defeat Ohio in the Mid-American Conference championship game Friday night.

The next highest ranked Group of Five team is No. 19 Navy (9-2), which will play Temple for the American Athletic Conference championship on Saturday at home.
